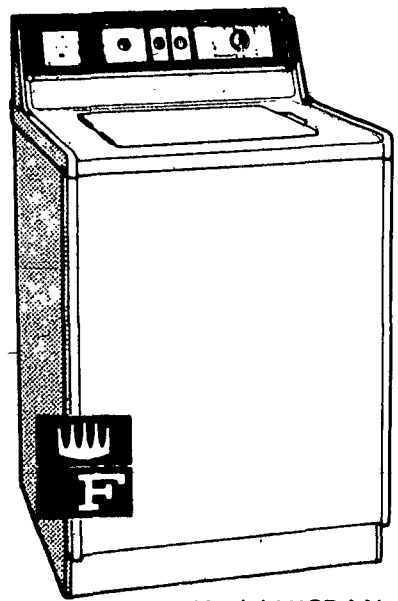

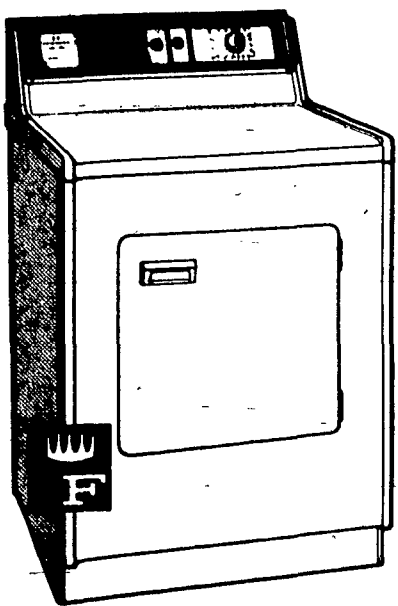

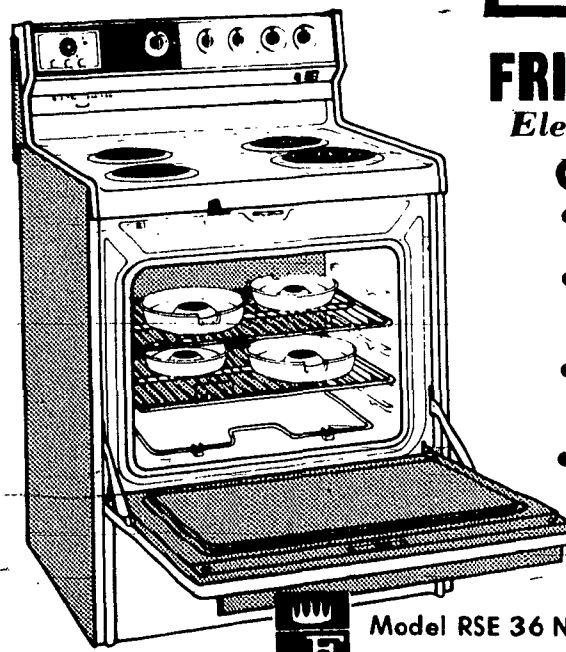

Among the most heartwarming stories of our time is that of Catholic Relief Services, overseas agency of American Catholics.

Lutheran's View

Protestants

Philadelphia — (RNS) — A Lutheran theologian declared in an article published here that "Protestantism is the church of the future" and that the future of the church is equipped with a papal office college of bishops.

Dr. Carl Braaten of the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago wrote of the "Protestantism of the future" in the Winter issue of the Journal of Lutheran Studies, published by the Lutheran World Federation.

After accepting the presuppositions of papacy and bishops, he said the church should "get on with the business of transforming both to fit modern needs and realities."

"The question is not whether we have a papacy and an episcopacy in — not outside of, or above — one people of God, but for whose sake and on what basis?"

The theologian began his article reflecting on a 1968 controversy caused by his reference to a "return to Rome."

In an article in Una Sancta, a dependent quarterly, Dr. Braaten played a parable in which Protestants were likened to exiles, and he called on Protestants to work for reconciliation with their "ecclesiastical home."

The weekly Christian Century editor Dr. Braaten's proposal "Protestantism" was defended by a number of theologians.
