What's on TV? Talk, Talk

As anyone who watches television at all can attest, the biggest thing currently preoccupying the networks is the talk show.

One may tune in as early as 7 a.m. with N.B.C.'s Today Show and continue until the following morning at 1 a.m. when locally both Johnny Carson and Joey Bishop sign off their respective programs.

In between, a viewer may take his choice of any or all of such talkathon efforts as those of Mike Douglas, Merv Griffin, Virginia Graham and Dick Cavett, the Yale graduate that ABC recently put to work in the mornings.

If you can pull in the Buffalo and Syracuse stations, you may also watch Gypsy Rose Lee and Helen Gurley Brown oozing charm as they attempt to pry secrets from their interviewees and captured audiences.

Happily for area viewers when Joey Bishop arrived on the local scene, Joe Pine soon disappeared. In this viewer's

opinion, allowing Pine on the air was perhaps the single most important instance of irresponsibility by any network or station in recent TV history.

At the opposite end of the interviewing spectrum is Mike Douglas whose show is seen here at 4:30 weekdays. Douglas comes off as a nice guy who enjoys his guests and seemingly would never do or ask anything to offend them in the slightest manner.

Besides parading the usual roster of show business peoplism, Douglas talks with doctors, authors, government aides and others who have something concrete to offer. And the best part is that he never finds it necessary to interrupt with questions that will show how well informed he is.

Joey Bishop may be the most inept of the interviewer-hosts. But his good taste, genuine warmth and lack of super ego more than make up for this deficiency. Others apparently feel likewise, for Bishop was not given much hope when ABC placed him opposite Carson in the night spot. Now, it is re-

ported that Bishop is not far behind Carson in popularity.

Carson and Griffin, I feel, are two of a kind. Both are extremely deft in making their guests shine. Neither has any qualms in playing off-color material for all the laughs he can squeeze from it and both appear to be their own biggest fans.

Like Douglas, each depends mainly on show business celebrities but try to bring in a "serious" guest from time to time. Carson, particularly, however, defeats this segment quite regularly as he interrupts, adds
