You may submit a variation of a standard recipe, but you must add your own personal touch.

Toward the close of the last POP Game we received several recipes from contestants. Because of lack of time we were unable to publish these or to give the bonus points in that game. We regret too that we can't use a few recipes which featured products no longer on the POP List. From time to time we will be bringing you the others and will credit them to your group in this current game.

One of these late arrivals is the following which was sent in by Mrs. Michael Kolchuk, POP Chairman for Mother of Sorrows Volunteer School Library Staff. (Mother of Sorrows parish, incidentally, has three groups registered for POP.)

Penny Casserole

- 2 cups Prince Elbow Macaroni
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped sweet Spanish onion
- 2 tbl. margarine
- 6 Maplecrest Frankfurters sliced thin (peppies)
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
- 1/2 soup can of milk
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Cook macaroni according to package directions and drain. Sauté green pepper and onion in margarine until soft but not brown. Add frankfurters and cook for 5 minutes. Add soup, milk, pepper and macaroni. Stir well and pour into greased casserole. Bake at 350 F for 30 minutes.

One of the nuns at St. Ambrose convent has come up with this recipe. Unfortunately she didn't include her name so we can't disclose her identity.

Sweet Gems

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup scalded milk
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup cold water
- 2 envelopes Red Star Active Dry Yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 7/8 cups sifted flour

Fruit jam
Thin icing of confectioners sugar and milk
Grated nut meats

Add shortening to scalded milk and stir until melted. Combine eggs, sugar, salt and beat in cold water. Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Combine the three mixtures and add flour gradually. Cover and refrigerate or use immediately. To form Gems, twist a small portion of dough into a long strip and swirl. Place on greased baking sheet and let rise about 1/2 hour. With a teaspoon make an indentation in the middle of each roll and fill with about 1/4 tsp. jam. Bake at 400 F about 15 minutes or until brown. While still warm cover with icing and sprinkle with grated nuts.

AT OUR HOUSE
Religious-Pilot Programs

It was a class of 34 six-year-olds, attentively studying catechism, "sharing the word of God," as they call it. With awe in her voice, Ruth spoke up:

"Why, God made Himself!"
A momentary look of surprise crossed Sister Noreen's face. Softly she said, "That's right."

Suddenly the nun realized that this child had absorbed the real lesson of God as Omnipotent Creator, a truth that usually comes only after an extensive study of metaphysics. And a six-year-old had put in plain simple words, "God made Himself."

This was no ordinary parochial school catechism class. It was one of the 202 classrooms in 50 United States dioceses chosen as pilot arenas for the introduction of a new religious instruction course. The course, sponsored by the Paulist Fathers, and with a text published by the Paulist Press, aims at inviting children to come to the life of prayer through words, pictures and music. Entitled

"Come to the Father," it supplants the former method of learning by rote. The old routine, rote method has been largely discarded as meaningless to children. In the meantime, have come many catechetical innovations.

This latest method, involving parents and parish priests as well as teacher and children, is aimed at awakening the child's realistic sense of God, an invitation into prayer-life and a growing awareness of God's call to share his love.

Creation

The lesson then being studied by the aforementioned class of six-year-olds was obviously the story of creation. The children were looking at a brightly colored picture of the rising sun reflected in a pool of green water, with trees and flowers all about. Banner-lined across the top of the page are the words, "God the Father all powerful made heaven and earth." Paraphrased under a heading of "God says," are words from the first chapter of Genesis:

"Let there be dry land and water, and there was dry land and water. Let there be in the sky a sun for the day and a moon for the night, and there was in the sky a sun for the day and a moon for the night."

The "Come to the Father" text remains in the home, based on the Church's belief that the primary teachers of religion are the parents. Prepared on a 35-week-basis, each week has two pages for the child, one for the parents. So closely is this woven into the teaching that the child recognizes pictures he has seen in school, the text and the music.

As to parents' acceptance, in the test area we observed at a parents' meeting, ratio was 75 to two in favor of the new program.

Acceptance by children observed is evident in their attention and ready responsiveness. Teachers find it "a natural" to teach, and parents, somewhat shy-at-first, soon delight in helping the child discover the signs of God in his life by starting with his own experiences, in the commonplace things about him. Parish priests collaborating in the program find in this a new spiritual link with their flock.

"These nations show ad ingly low standards in ed tion, health, transportation, c munications and other vital :tors. Often submerged in p tical crisis, their governme oscillate between military : civilian dictatorships, with quant disregard for democ principles.
