## New Radio Show

### To Air Views of 'Man In the Street'

New York—(RNS)—A national call-in radio show will give the Negro "man in the street," and his white counterpart a chance to talk over the issues separating them.

"Night Call," a program released by the Television, Radio and Film Commission of the Methodist Church, in cooperation with the National Council of Churches' Broadcasting and Film Commission and the National Office for Radio and Television, will begin broadcasting June 3.

Originating live in New York, Night Call will use a unique system of leased telephone lines to the participating stations together. It expects to reach 4 million listeners.

Nelson Price, executive producer, said that although radio programs are increasing turning to the use of the telephone-talk format, none — until "Night Call" — has been able to reach a nationwide audience and permit them to join the dialogue.

## Kids' Shows Lack Imagination

Replacing the Spider-Man-Frankenstein Jr. genre will be cartoons of the Bugs Bunny variety which the networks hope will quiet the audience of mothers who have been horror-stricken at the brutality dished out on weekends. That would then allow the sponsors to get back to the prime business of enticing children into bullying parents for over-animated dolls, super-mechanized toys and sugarcorned cereals.

If the news of the change has brought sighs of relief to many, surely it must have nettled a few parents who have never found Bugs more than a long-eared bore to be treated with only a little more tolerance than the "hilarious" torture segments now prevalent on Saturday mornings.

Certainly there must be some who feel that network television's biggest crime in the area of programming is not so much the blood-letting but rather attempting to use the attention-getting blood and thunder style in lieu of imagination. Then when Mamat cries "Foul" they substitute pap.

It has been reported that during the recent furor over kids fare, one network executive noted that they could put together the most educational shows possible saturating it with science, infusing it with information and all the other things parents are supposed to like so much for their children.

"And," the executive finished, "not a kid would watch it."

Undoubtedly, and why should they, if it was done without imagination or any other bait to lure the juvenile mind?

It is difficult to understand why men so brilliant that they can millions upon millions of kids WANT and buy countless numbers of Barbie Dolls and GI Joes cannot make a scientific show so intriguing that kids would trip over themselves on the way to the TV set.

Captain Kangaroo has long been held up as a good example of creative programming but it has been proved that mothers like Captain more than the kids do. Obviously not creative enough.

Leonard Bernstein and his Young People's Concerts are praised as a step in the right direction — to captivate the young mind but Bernstein, no matter how much the adult may enjoy him, tends toward

Adaptations of books have generally proved disastrous as TV fare. Somehow the charm of the story which prompted the producer to bring it to TV in the first place is missing when the show is finished.
