**R.J. Hasenauer, Music Director**

A Requiem Mass for Raymond J. Hasenauer was offered by his pastor, Monsignor Maynard A. Conrell, at St. Margaret Mary's Church on Saturday, April 20, 1968.

Funeral services were held April 18, for Gerard L. Maier, 174 Grecian Gardens, who died April 14.

Requiem Mass was celebrated by Very Rev. Scraphin Winter- both, O.M.—Cap.—of St. Fidelis Priory, Interlaken.

Interment was in Holy Sepul- chre Cemetery, where Father Winterboth gave the blessing.

Mr. Maier was the brother of Sister Rosalie, SSJ, a teacher at Nazareth Academy. He is survived, also by his wife, Sophie; Michael Maier, two sons, Edward and Raymond; four grandchildren, two brothers, Raymond W. and Rufus F. Maier.

**Fr. John LaVeque**

Father John W. LaVeque, died Wed., April 17, was buried from his own parish, St. John of Rochester, Perinton on Mon., April 22. Celebrant of the Mass was Bishop John McCafferty, assisted by Fathers William Schifferli, John Kleintjes, Raymond Heisel, Joseph Gaynor. Fourteen other friends and classmates were concelebrants.

Bishop James E. Kearney preached the eulogy and lauded Father LaVeque for his three-fold career as parish priest, chaplain at St. Agnes High School and founder-pastor of St. John of Rochester Church. Bishop Kearney said that "he was always the priest, a holy and learned man who changed the lives of many St. Agnes girls." His pastoral love for his people was so exem- plary, the bishop said "the zeal of God's house literally wore him out."

Mr. Hasenauer, 63, well known area band and choir di- rector, died on Tuesday, April 16, 1968 after a long illness. He lived at 299 Cooper Road in Irondequoit.

The Rochester musician di- rected many local musical groups over a long career, in- cluding the University of Roch- ester Marching Band, the Roch- ester Gas and Electric Chorus and the Interparochial High School Concert Band.

He also directed a number of church choirs at various times, most recently his own parish choir at St. Margaret Mary's Church.

Mr. Hasenauer was best known for his 22-year associa- tion with Aquinas Institute where he was director of music. During his tenure, the Aquinas marching band achieved a wide measure of fame for its musical talent and precision marching.

He left Aquinas in 1954 to teach music in the Greece Cen- tral School District. His last as- signment before his illness had been with the Paddy Hill School.

A graduate of the University of Rochester, Mr. Hasenauer held a Master's degree in music from the Eastman School.

Survivors include his wife, Marcella; a son, Raymond J. Jr., a daughter, Mrs. Robert Treacy; his sister, Mrs. Marcella Schickler, and eight grandchildren, all of Rochester.

**INDIA: A MISSION GROWS**  
THE HOLY FATHER'S MISSION AID TO THE ORIENTAL CHURCH

The area, called Chanda, is twice the size of Massachusetts. It has 28 million people, only a handful of whom are Christians. This week the temperature is 114 degrees. . . Still, Carmelite superior Monsignor Januarius reports from central India that his 26 priests are bringing the faith for the first time to low caste people who never heard of Christ. He writes: "Pray for us, please. I wish you could be here to share our joy!"

Some of the priests were helped as seminarians (\$8.50 a month) by readers of this column. Now they need bicycles (\$47 each), motorcycles (\$738 each, in India), a 4-wheel-drive Jeep (\$2,450), to quadruple their time and save their strength. Adds Monsignor Januarius: "Can you imagine how grateful the sick will be if our Sisters can drive to the villages regularly in a mobile clinic ("hospital-on-wheels")? We can get one, fully equipped, for only \$4,900." . . . Our priests in Chanda (the mission was started by Pope John) need everyone's gifts (\$1,000, \$500, \$250, \$100, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5, \$1) this week to help the hungry and diseased. Walk to the corner mailbox. Monsignor Nolan will thank you in Monsignor Januarius' name.

"The long-term prospects are excellent," says Monsignor Januarius, "but how can we work if we have no place to live, to instruct children, to offer daily Mass?" In 15 villages, where new converts are being made, he needs a church (\$1,785), a school (\$2,150), a rectory (\$675), and a convent (\$1,225). (The costs are low for the labor is free-of-charge) And you may name the church or school for your favorite saint, in your loved ones' memory. . . \$160 will support a parish for a month. . . Mass stipends are the only income Monsignor Januarius and his priests receive. They are free to offer Masses promptly.
