Inter-Faith Dialogue: Action or Talk?

South Orange, N.J.—(NC)—“Should Jewish-Christian dialogue be by speech or by action?” was the theme that ran through discussions at a Conference on Interfaith Dialogue sponsored by Catholic, Protestant and Jewish organizations at Seton Hall University here (April 23).

Rabbi Marc H. Tanenbaum, director of interreligious affairs for the American Jewish Committee, was generally in favor of the action approach. He said that dialogue must avoid becoming a convenient conspiracy on the part of middle-class whites.

Father Edward H. Flannery, executive secretary of the U.S. Catholic Bishops' Secretariat for Catholic-Jewish Relations, said that Jews and Christians could not effectively present a common front to society until they have straightened out their own affairs.

In his talk, Father Flannery referred to statements that the Christian-Jewish dialogue, had died in the wake of last June's six-day war between Israel and the Arab nations.

The author of “The Anguish of the Jews,” a study of 2,000 years of anti-Semitism, Father Flannery said that the misunderstandings of both Jewish and Christian positions during last June's war indicated that the dialogue must be reborn on a more intellectual level. “We must consider the question of the Jewish-Christian relations

theologically, rethink positions that Christians have for too long taken for granted.”

Father Flannery said Christians must ask themselves what they have to learn from Judaism. He pointed out several areas: Judaic emphasis on monotheism, the healthy naturalism of the Jews, the essential social nature of both Judaism and Christianity.

Rabbi Tanenbaum said that the last nine months have transformed Jews here and throughout the world into a new realization of what the state of Israel means to them.

The rabbi also denied the report that there had been insufficient response from U.S. Christians to Israel's appeal. He pointed to polls which showed that a heavy majority of Amer-

icans favored specific positions such as Israel's right to send its ships through the Suez Canal.

But Rabbi Tanenbaum also decried the insensitivity of all U.S. religious groups to the terrors taking place today throughout the world, mentioning specifically the massacres in Biafra, African state that broke away from Nigeria.

Cardinal Lercaro To Represent Pope

Vatican City—(NC)—Pope Paul VI has named Giacomo Cardinal Lercaro, former archbishop of Bologna, as his personal representative to the 28th International Eucharistic Congress in Bogota beginning Aug. 25. Cardinal Lercaro's appointment does not rule out the possibility that the Pope himself may attend some ceremonies during the congress. The Pope named Legates to the Eucharistic Congress in India and to the 50th anniversary observances at Fatima and at the same time personally visited both.

Sevilla, Spain—(NC)—Rural police have closed all roads to La Alcaparrosa farm at Palmar de Troya, about 30 miles from here, to stop curious throngs attracted by unconfirmed reports that four children had seen “apparitions” of the Blessed Virgin there.

Meanwhile Church authorities, who at first showed strong reservations, are considering an investigation of the reports from the children. Some adults have claimed that they also saw the apparitions in an open field.
