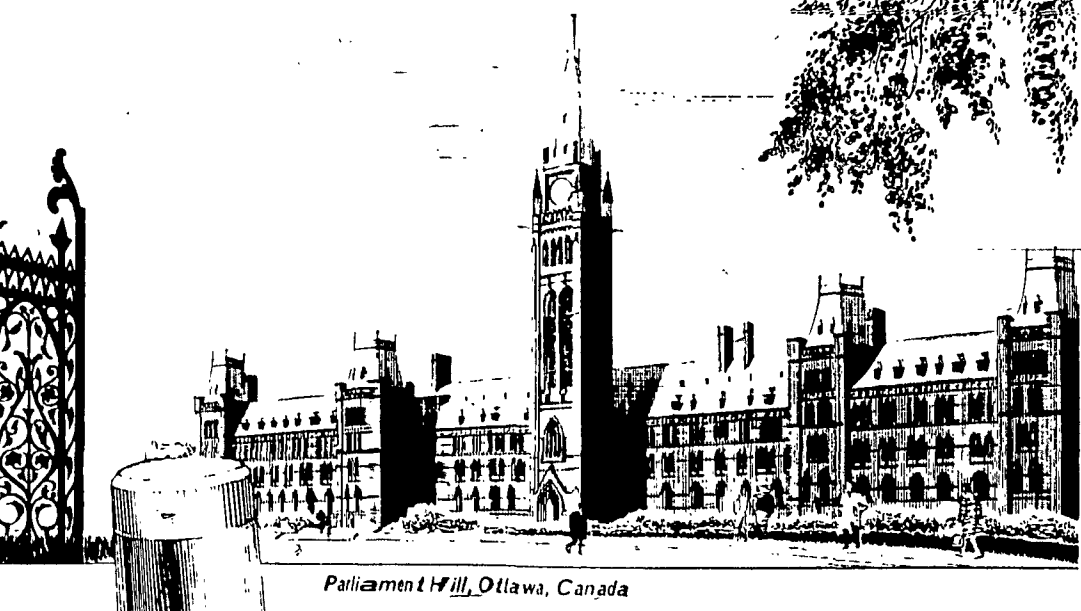

The Montfort Singers have made several nationwide television appearances and have recorded several albums of records. They are much in demand in the Midwest, particularly among teen-agers.

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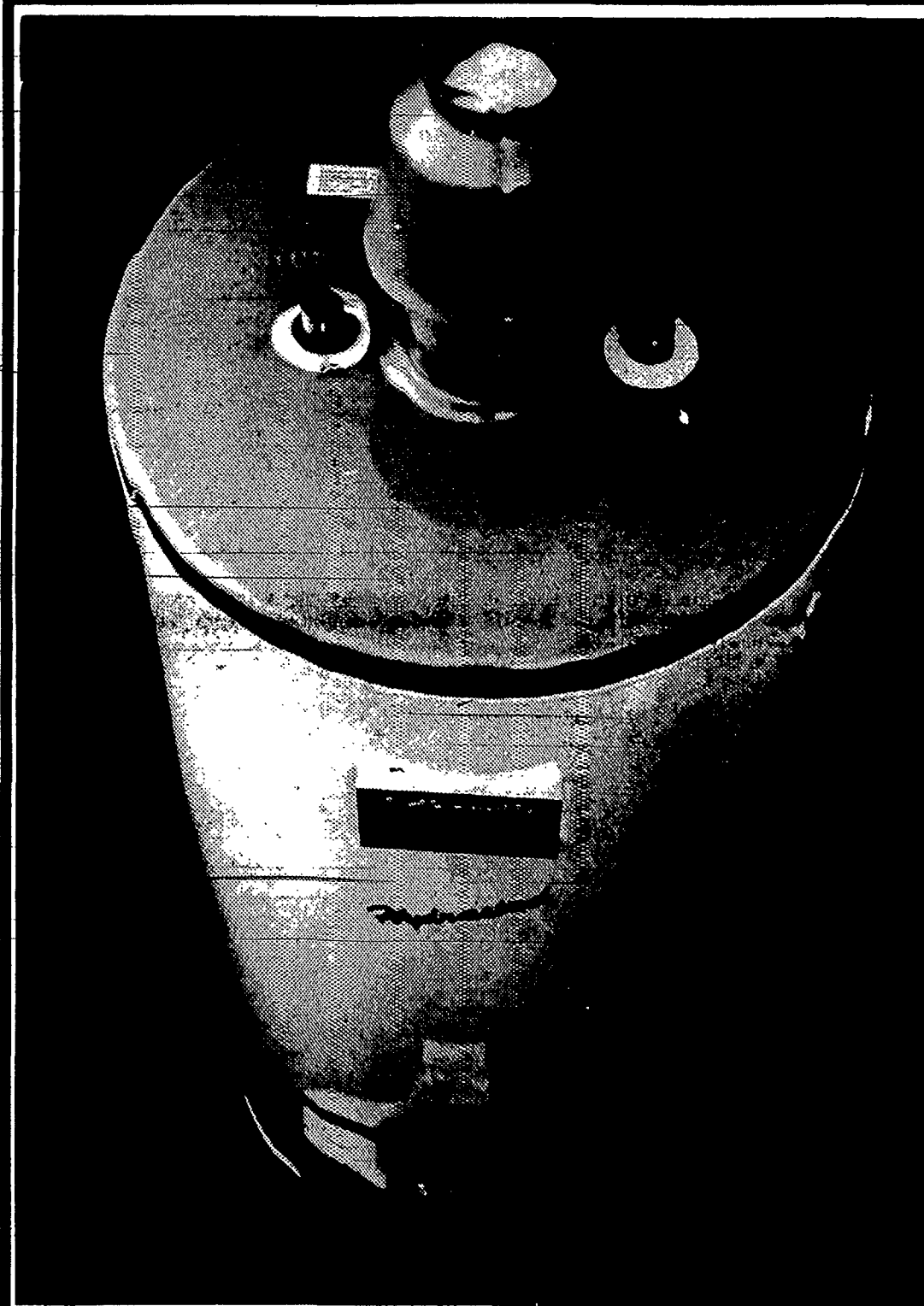
