

# Church Should Borrow Ideas From Industry, Speaker Says

Avon — The Church might borrow a few ideas from industry and business in planning for the future, an expert on Christian formation told an ecumenical seminar here recently.

Mark Gibbs, currently acting as consultant to the Episcopal diocese of Rochester, addressed a group of Protestant and Catholic clergy and lay leaders in a two-evening seminar.

Just to begin emphasizing the future would be a good start, the Anglican educator told his listeners. He made his point neatly with this observation:

"In one large city I visited recently, I found that in the many seminaries there, there were approximately 20 professors of Church History. I did not find one professor of 'Church Future,' however."

Gibbs spoke at Zion Episcopal Church to a group of approximately 20 clerical and lay representatives of Avon's several churches. His assignment in the Rochester area is to advise the Episcopal Church on its Christian education program. The pastor of Zion Episcopal, the Rev. Peter M. Norman thought his guest speaker's ideas might be helpful to the other churches, so made it an ecumenical seminar.

Most industries have departments of research, development and information; "why shouldn't the Church have departments along the same lines," Gibbs asked.

In developing a program of total Christian formation, a parish might ask itself these questions in determining priorities, he suggested:

• What content should be aimed for? Whom are we trying to reach? How long will each program last? What techniques will be used? What staff is available? Where to hold the programs? What finances are available? What structure will be needed?

Gibbs outlined six areas of lay responsibility that face today's Christian, and that should form the content of Christian formation: these are family (and personal) relationships, neighborhood, parish, work, leisure and finally public life.

Among the thought-provoking ideas proffered by the visiting lecturer were these:

• The "restless" and "fringe" parishioners should be offered some opportunities to learn, as well as the "tried and true" parishioners.

Paul's Encyclical Recommended As International Law
