

# More Aid Urged for Vietnam

New York — (RNS) — U.S. aid efforts in Vietnam are "insignificant" when compared to the problems there and the amount of money and effort being devoted to military action, an American priest said here.

Father Robert J. Charlebois, 37, of Gary, Ind., has been the director of Catholic Relief Services in South Vietnam for the past year. He is in New York for consultation with CRS officials.

He said that reductions in the American foreign aid appropriation can seriously damage hope for any kind of stability or peace in Vietnam.

He added that many Vietnamese are worrying that American aid will be withdrawn if and when U.S. military action ends in Vietnam.

He added that the work of CRS and all the other agencies in Vietnam will be needed for the foreseeable future.

"If peace came tomorrow, we would still have enough to keep us busy at least for the rest of this century."

A measure of the size of the relief problem can be seen in the number of Vietnamese who were aided through CRS during the past year: 17 million recipients of food, medicine and clothing.

In Saigon alone, 133,000 persons have been made refugees since the Tet offensive and 13,000 homes have been destroyed in the recent escalation of shelling in Saigon by Vietcong and North Vietnamese troops.

Besides distributing supplies to those in need, CRS is active in long-term assistance and development projects, medical care and orphanages.

Its work is ecumenical, with most of its aid going to non-Catholics in

Vietnam and a number of Protestants, Buddhists and animists among its personnel, the priest said. Most of the 43 CRS staff members in Vietnam are Americans, but others come from the Philippines, Australia, Canada, Korea and Ireland.

The agency serves as a consultant on social action for five of the 14 Buddhist sects in Vietnam, aids a Buddhist orphanage in Hue and supplies teachers for a Buddhist school of social work in Saigon.

Food distributed by CRS is supplied by the U.S. government from American surplus production. Clothing and medical supplies are either donated by other sources (including the annual CRS clothing drive), or purchased with cash donations. The value of donations from other sources is approximately equal to that of the U.S. surplus food.

## Saigon Archbishop Issues Urgent Call For End of Shelling

Saigon — (NC) — Archbishop Paul Nguyen Van Binh of Saigon has called urgently for an end to the indiscriminate bombardment of this city hit by Communist rockets and mortars almost nightly.

Explosives have been fired into Saigon for seven weeks killing and wounding civilians and destroying homes. Under cover of darkness, rockets, each carrying 145 pounds of TNT, have been launched from points as far as six miles from the place of impact. They are apparently aimed blindly at districts rather than at specific targets.

"For the past week, like my fellow citizens, I have been conscious of these night bombardments," the archbishop told N.C. News Service. "In the mornings I have gone to visit the places hit and have learned the sad news about the innocent victims. They are usually women and children among them."

"As archbishop of Saigon, I am deeply saddened by these sufferings inflicted by indiscriminate attacks on this densely populated city. I call on those responsible to end these bombardments which cannot be justified by any military considerations."

## Archbishop Cooke To Visit Servicemen

Fort Monmouth, N.J. — (RNS) — Archbishop Terence J. Cooke of New York told military personnel here that he will be spending Christmas with U.S. fighting men overseas.

Addressing 650 troops, the New York archbishop said he is not saying that any of you will be far away next Christmas, but if you are, I'll be there.

In announcing that he would continue the tradition of yuletide visits started by Cardinal Spellman, the archbishop indicated that he would not wait until Christmas to visit overseas personnel. He has announced a trip in August to Bogota, Colombia, to attend the International Eucharistic Congress.

On the way to Bogota, Archbishop Cooke intends to visit as many military posts as possible in Puerto Rico and the Panama Canal Zone.

## German Parish Expropriated

Berlin — (NC) — East German communist authorities have expropriated the Catholic parish of St. Francis Xavier in East Berlin without compensating the Church.

## AROUND THE WORLD

### Knights of Malta Back on the Island

Vatican City — (RNS) — The grand master of the Knights of Malta made an official visit this week to the island — the first since the military-religious order was expelled by Napoleon's armies 170 years ago.

Prince Fra Angelo de Mojana di Cologna, a Milanese attorney, heads the order, which now is engaged chiefly in charitable work.

Originally established to protect and house pilgrims going to Jerusalem and to guard the Holy Sepulchre, the Order of Malta was driven from the Holy Land by the Moslems and settled in Rhodes, where it ruled from 1310 to 1522.

Expelled by the Turks, the Knights moved to Malta, which they ruled from 1530 to 1798. In 1565, they withstood a three-month siege by an army of 40,000 Turks, but they were unable to hold off the Napoleonic armies in a later century.

### Israel Accused of Fostering Christian Values

Jerusalem — (RNS) — The Israeli Cabinet is pondering charges by a National Religious Party spokesman that Israel is "fostering Christian values."

Yitzhak Raphael has taken exception to official use of Christian symbols on postage stamps and literature; to Christian-oriented programs on the state radio, and to the use of national buildings for Christian concerts. Concert-going Israelis have lately been startled by interruptions of Bach's "Passion According to St. Matthew" by protestors.

### Social Activist Named Bishop

Vatican City — (NC) — Auxiliary Bishop Francis Anthony Marrocco, 55, of Toronto has been named bishop of Peterborough, Ont.

He was born at Peterborough of Italian immigrant parents. Ordained in 1938, he worked in a parish for five years and then attended the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., where he took courses in social action.

In 1948, he was named by the Canadian bishops to head their social action section. He established the Institution of Social Action at St. Patrick's College, which cooperated with the Canadian government in various programs, and founded also the annual Catholic social life conference.

### Berlin Church Scores Rival Group

East Berlin — (RNS) — Catholic authorities here have denied assertions of the Berlin Conference of Catholic Christians from European States that the hierarchy has softened its opposition to the communist-oriented organization.

The Archdiocese of Berlin declared that the bishops of East Germany are as opposed to the present meeting as they have been to the two preceding sessions. It also denied reports which indicated the conference opened with a Mass at St. Hedwig's Cathedral here.

The conference concluded with a number of resolutions and manifestos, including denunciations of "American genocide in Vietnam," West German "imperialism" and "Neo-Nazi activities" in West Germany.

### Greek Church Issues Abortion Warning

Athens — (RNS) — An encyclical prepared by the Holy Synod of the Orthodox Church of Greece and scheduled for reading on Aug. 15 in all churches, expresses alarm at the decline in the population of Greece and emphasizes the traditional teaching that abortion is "a deadly sin."

"While other countries face a problem of over-population, Greece faces a problem of survival," the synod declared. "Very soon, our country will become a 'country of old men.'"

### Spain's Protestants Resist Registration

Madrid — (RNS) — Baptist Pastor Jose Cardona Gregori, leading spokesman for Spain's Protestants, announced here that 150 Protestant congregations have registered as "confessional associations" with the Spanish Ministry of Justice. They represent only half of the nation's 30,000 Protestants, he said.

The Catholic Church is not required to register its congregations or to submit budget statements.

Mr. Cardona said that among the denominations with registered congregations were the Plymouth Brethren, Baptists, Mormons, Seventh-day Adventists and Anglicans.

Some groups have so far resisted registration, he exclaimed, because "they consider the religious freedom law discriminatory and prefer to wait for new legislation by the Spanish government to ensure genuine religious freedom in accordance with the decisions of the Second Vatican Council."

### Church Relocated in Theatre, Shop

Stockholm — (NC) — The congregation of St. Eugenia's Catholic church, ejected by urban renewal, has moved to the ABC Theater.

The city of Stockholm placed at parish disposal the theater, a public bath for use as a parish hall, a photocopying shop for use as a rectory and office, and a chemist's shop to be used as a parish bookstore.

At a cost of \$190,000, the city temporarily restored the old buildings and provided assistance for moving. Experts from the city museum supervised the removal and storage of various sacred objects from the 130-year-old church, the oldest Catholic church in Scandinavia.
