Edinburgh, Scotland—(NC)—The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland voted (May 22) to make women eligible for ordination to the ministry on the same terms and conditions as men.

There are in the Church about 10 deaconesses who now seek ordination. The Church of Scotland (Presbyterian), Scotland's national church, was founded by John Knox in 1560. It has about 1.2 million members.

Two June graduates of McQuaid High are producers of a short film on a space journey to Mars.

They had to use their imagination, of course, for nobody has made the trip yet. (Unless those spooky people on TV "invaders" are for real.)

Raymond Villari and Christopher Rogers turned out a 20 minute film, complete with narrative and musical background on a synchro-tape, and called it "Expedition to the Red Planet." Considering that it was a small budget (just pocket money), the equipment (one Keystone millimeter camera with zoom lens) and part time (adding up to some 200 hours in all) project, it is a very realistic effort.

The viewer is treated to scenes of a realistic blast-off, various sections of the spaceship assembling in space, inside shots of the crew at the navigation stations and a newly executed landing on Mars. There are even some imaginative shots of the Martian landscape, over which the explorers are shown traveling in a track-equipped vehicle.

The main "set" for the filming was the attic of Ray Villari's home at 85 Brook Ave. Using models of spacecraft and black background, the youth filmmakers simulated motion by using zoom lens or by walking with their camera as they shot.

Inside shots of the spaceship were handled in an ingenious manner. The students built a circular frame, open on top, then peeped it with Matt Mason astronaut doll stationed before instrument boards lighting up in a thematic way.

"Planets" appearing in the film (Earth, Mars, Saturn) are balloons painted by Chris Rogers, who did most of the needed art work. To achieve the effects they wanted, the frequently resorted to double and triple exposures on the same film footage.
