Father Rene Laurentin French writer, teacher and eminent Mariologist who helped prepare the Vatican II "Constitution on the Church," will give two lectures here this afternoon, July 12, under the auspices of St. Bernard's Seminary.

His talks, for priests and nuns, will be at 2:30 and 4:30 p.m. in the Nazareth College gymnasium. The subjects: "The Blessed Motther in the Gospel of St. John," and "The Blessed Mother and the Role of Women

Father Laurentin teaches at the Catholic University of Angers and writes on religious matters for the Paris daily "Figaro." This summer, he is giving a graduate course in the theology department of the University of Dayton.

He is a veteran of World War II, and holds the Croix de Guerre for distinguished service. Five of his army years were spent in a German prison camp. where, continuing his seminary studies privately, he took up Mariology, the subject that be-
