## Gun Friends, Foes 'Shoot It Out' on TV

If you're one of those viewers who think that summer television is dull, then chances are you haven't been watching the Dick Cavett Show.

A couple of weeks ago I rhapsodized here over seeing Margaret Hamilton on the ABC morning talk show. Miss Hamilton is the unpretty actress best remembered for her witch's performance in the movie version of "The Wizard of Oz."

A couple of days ago I channeled in again on Mr. Cavett's show and was rewarded with the liveliest debate (argument, fight?) that I've seen on television since singer Jane Morgan and humorist Al Capp exchanged verbal blows on Johnny Carson's late night program four years ago.

And this was infinitely more rewarding since rather than dealing in personalities and capabilities as Miss Morgan and Mr. Capp did the conflict revolved around the National Rifle Association's (NRA) fight to prevent legislation calling for registration of guns and other related restrictions.

Between checking to see which child was playing where and setting up the ironing board I missed the first guest, singer John Davidson and also the introduction of the second, Hollywood director Frank Mankiewicz.

About the time I started paying attention Mankiewicz was deploring and articulating, too, the long time practice of Western scripts to solve all problems with guns. He pointed out how in films the little guy, heretofore ridiculed and stepped on, could become the hero by killing the villain with the implication clear that it was not necessarily too many steps from watching such a philosophy acted out to assuming it as one's own.

At this point Cavett noted that Mankiewicz was one of several persons who had during the preceding weeks appeared to speak in behalf of national legislation for gun controls.

Thus, said Cavett, it was only fair that a representative for the opposition should have the opportunity to give the dissenting viewpoint and proceeded to introduce Harold Glassen of the NRA.

For approximately five minutes the head of a rifle organization whose members number more than a million had the undivided interest of the studio and national audience as he told how he feared for the convenience of the NRA at present and in the future for the total confiscation of their pleasure weapons.

He also added a few beliefs such as the one that the actions of the NRA could not be construed as lobbying, that it was not the federal government's business to know which of its private citizens hold guns and assorted other pertinent opinions, long familiar to readers of the daily headlines.

At this point Mankiewicz stepped in and began to challenge him point by point, most importantly on the fact that despite the NRA's loudly asserted fears no legislation for gun controls ever introduced has called for confiscation of weapons from the responsible private citizen.

When Mankiewicz tired, Cavett took over, reading at one point, a list of 10 accusations made by the NRA against federal encroachment

of their rights and the step by step factual refutation by the Treasury Department.

At no time would Glassen back down. His arguments had been prepared and he was sticking by them although at times in the light of Messrs. Mankiewicz and Cavett's rebuttals there was a ludicrous moment or so provoking the laughter of those watching.

I almost laughed too. But the irony was too great. Only hours before that same morning I'd read the news story out of Washington that said that Congress had defeated the gun registration bill. The National Rifle Association, as always, had won again in spite of the fact that according to the polls 80 per cent of us in this country are for strong gun controls.

## Books

**THE FUTURE AS THE PRESENCE OF SHARED HOPE** — ed. by Sister Maryellen Muckenhirn — (Sheed, \$4.50) — A worthwhile collection in view of the scarcity of modern thought, in the area of eschatology, which treats of the "last things": death, judgement, heaven, hell. Hope for the improvement of the lot of humanity is studied from the standpoint of the Jewish experience and from Christian perception.

## Fr. Greeley To Be on TV

Father Andrew M. Greeley, author and sociologist, returns to the "Catholic Hour" on radio for the four Sundays of August in a repeat of his series on recent changes in the Church in America.

Based on his best-selling book, "The Hesitant Pilgrim" (Sheed and Ward), the talks will examine such subjects as "the American experience" of the Church, the intellectual life of contemporary America and Catholicism; the future of Catholic education in America and social change in the Church.

Father Greeley is senior project director for the National Opinion Research Center and a lecturer in sociology at the University of Chicago.

**NO EXIT** — by Sebastian Moore — (Newman; \$3.95) — The author, whose style has been described as that "of a formidably literate and articulate, and a theologianically sophisticated, Malcolm Boyd," ably presents a plea for understanding of Christ as a man who was not content to exist in a vacuum as most of His followers have been content to do. In a series of 19 meditations, he succeeds in removing Christ from the realm of theological abstraction and presenting Him with human identification, in delightful as well as instructive fashion.

**WORD AND MYSTERY** — Leo J. Donovan, ed. (Newman; \$4.95) — A book primarily of use to students of the Bible, the "word" and the "mystery" of this work, refer, respectively to Scripture and to Christ, and to the mystery of Christ as revealed in the Scriptures. The essays fall into 2 groups: those treating of the ways in which the New Testament authors express their faith in Christ and His mission; those elucidating various mysteries in the life of Christ as they are recorded in the Bible.


**THE EUCHARIST** — by Edward Schillebeeckx (Sheed & Co.; \$3.95) — This treatise on the

reality of Christ's presence in the Eucharist concerns one of the most vexing and controversial questions being discussed by theologians today — whether and how Christ is present in the Eucharist. He maintains the Real Presence although with qualifications that should make the position he delineates acceptable to the partisans of one extreme as to those of the other. One of the most important of modern theologians, he demonstrates his talent for standing where reasons stand: between reverence for tradition and an equally inflated devotion to change for its own sake.

**Bishop To Serve Brazilian Missions**  
Vatican City — (NC) — Sixty-four-year-old Bishop Renato Luisi of Nicastrò, Italy, has asked Pope Paul VI to relieve him of his See so that he can become a missionary in Brazil, and the Pope has consented.

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
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
