Whether you're a housewife or a working gal, there's nothing like a vacation to get you out of the routine, to stimulate you to greater effort when you return. Even a stay-at-home vacation can be pleasant if Dad or another member of the family takes over the cooking chores for a few days. Some men, in fact, like to try their hand at baking. If you're lucky enough to have such a spouse, here's the perfect recipe to let him show off his culinary talents.

RASPBERRY RIBBON CAKE

- 3 cups sifted cake flour
- 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup Land O'Lakes Butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 tsp. almond extract
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/8 tsp. red food coloring

RASPBERRY BUTTER CREAM (see below)

First grease 2-8x8x2 pans, dust with flour. Sift cake flour along with baking powder and salt onto waxed paper. Cream butter until soft, beat in sugar gradually until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, until fluffy again, then add the flavorings. Stir in flour mixture, alternately with the milk, just until well blended. Spoon half of batter into one pan. Stir food coloring into remaining batter and pour into second pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool completely.

RASPBERRY BUTTER CREAM

- 1 pkg. Cream Cheese (3 oz. size)
- 4 Tbl. Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1/2 cup mashed fresh raspberries
- 1-1 pound package Confectioners Sugar

Blend Cream Cheese with butter until fluffy using medium mixing bowl. Beat in raspberries. Stir until smooth. Measure out 1 1/2 cups for filling. Beat rest of sugar into remaining mixture for frosting sides and tops.

To assemble: Split oiled layers using very sharp knife or heavy thread. Place a white layer on bottom of cake plate, spread with one half cup of filling. Next a pink layer, another 1/2 cup filling, a white layer the remaining filling and top with pink layer. Frost top and sides with frosting. Refrigerate until about 1/2 hour before serving time.

If it's your teens who are helping with vacation cooking, they'll be looking for "easy" snack recipes. This one requires no baking at all.

'POP' OAT CLUSTERS (about 4 dozen)

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 3 cups uncooked Quick Oats

Combine sugar, milk, butter and salt in 3 qt. saucepan. Bring to a full boil and boil for one minute. Remove from heat, add vanilla and peanut butter. Stir until smooth. Add oats and mix well. Cool slightly. Drop mounds by tablespoon onto wax paper lined cookie sheets. Cool completely.

Queen's Pudding

- 1 pkg. gelatin (any flavor)
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 large can evaporated milk
- Crust
- 1 packet graham crackers, crushed
- 1/4 cup Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1/4 cup sugar

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add sugar and cold water. Mix thoroughly. Place milk in a bowl and let stand in freezer compartment until ice particles gather on surface. Then beat until stiff. When gelatin is partly set, mix with whipped milk. For crust, combine the 3 ingredients and press into 13x9x2 inch pan, reserving a small amount for garnish. Pour gelatin-milk combination into crust and cover with remaining crumb mixture. Chill about 2 hours before serving.

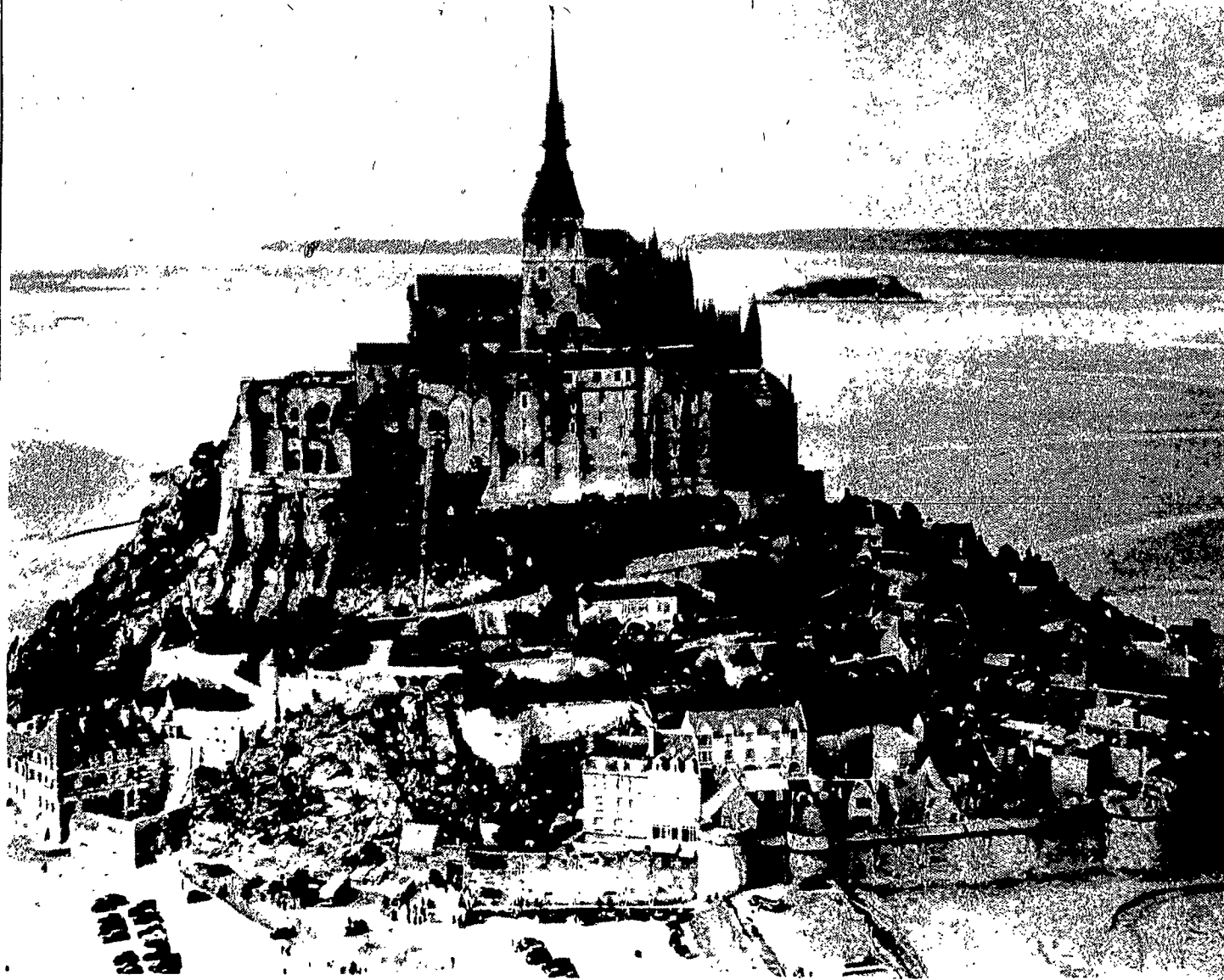

Famous Churches of the World



Mont-St. Michel, France

Mont-St. Michel is a Benedictine abbey built on a rock which juts 300 feet out of the waters of the Atlantic off the coast of Normandy, France.

The monastery was founded about the year 708 by St. Aubert, Bishop of Avranches.

and, according to the legend, by direct command of St. Michael the Archangel.

The rock is nearly a mile from shore and in 1880 a causeway was built across the quicksand. It is exposed at low tide and there is no dan-

ger in approaching the abbey. The group of buildings has been the subject of several important monographs. The most remarkable building is "la Merveille" (the marvel) X on the north side of the rock facing the ocean. Half

military and half monastic, it is built wholly of granite quarried on the mainland and was entirely constructed between 1203 and 1228. The church is a cruciform with a Norman nave.

Father Baum to Be Speaker at CFM Meeting in Buffalo

Father Gregory Baum, O.S.A., author and theologian, will address a regional convention of the Christian Family Movement at Rosary Hill College in the suburbs of Buffalo on Saturday, Aug. 24, at 2:30 p.m.

Approximately 1,000 visitors are expected at the full-day gathering of CFM representatives from western Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and central and western New York State.

The convention theme will be "Brotherhood and Peace."

Father Baum, professor of theology at St. Michael's College, Toronto, was a consultant theologian at the Vatican Council and is the author of books on ecumenism and marriage theology.

The Rochester Diocese has 25 groups of CFM couples, with 5 to 10 couples in each group, according to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Culhane of Our Lady Queen of Peace parish, the CFM Contact Couple for Rochester. Rochester proper has nearly 75 couples active in CFM.

3 Parishes Seek Inner City Pupils

Two more suburban parishes and one on the eastern edge of the city have invited inner-city children to enroll in their schools this year.

Our Lady of Lourdes in Brighton has room for 10 in the primary department; St. Louis, Pittsford, has arranged to take 10 first graders from the St. Bridget neighborhood, and St. John the Evangelist in Humboldt Street wants 16 first and second graders.

Three other parochial schools, all suburban, had made arrangements earlier for inner-city "guests" through the Diocesan District transportation staff. They are St. Thomas the Apostle, Irondequoit, St. Jerome's, East Rochester, and Our Mother of Sorrows, Greece.

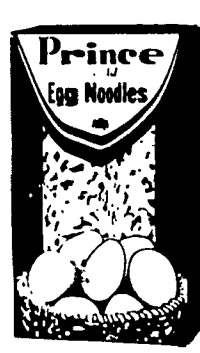
Soccer Ball Day: Lancers Vs. Newark

Inadequacy

Morgan Hill, Calif. — Just Rodriguez lifted a hand from the steering wheel of his pickup truck and pointed to the sign in the Morgan Hill orchard. Among the neat, ordered rows of fruit trees was the remains of a posted warning: "No Trespassing."
Rodriguez drove past the sign a good mile, slowed down, then guided the truck off the paved road and through the orchards at an open fields of a small ranch.
Dust clouds billowed behind the truck and drifted slowly in the still heat. Rodriguez pulled to a stop in front of a five-unit barrack that had the tired look of an abandoned motel. It quartered some 80 people, most of them Mexican-Americans.

Rodriguez entered one of the cramped units, and Spanish greeted the man at the house, his wife, three of their children and two young men, apparently neighbors. They were a small crowd but they easily filled the front room. The ceiling was low and the lighting dim. The room held kitchen utensils, a small table, a few wicker chairs, and a low-slung double bed.
The family was one of some 400 migrant households which strap mattresses and bedding to the top of weary wagons and roll into the Morgan Hill area in late May. They leave after the harvest season in late August.
Rodriguez, a poverty program worker, struggles to find work, housing, transportation and employment for the migrants during their stay in Morgan Hill.
He works closely, it was officially, with Father James P. McIntee, assistant pastor of St. Catherine's parish in Morgan Hill.

The soft-spoken Father McIntee sees the many problems of the migrants entering, like the spokes of a wheel, from a single center: inadequate housing.
"Sickness gallops through family that lives in such close quarters. A man and his wife can have no privacy. The teenagers are bitterly aware that things should be better. They become angry and wild at get in trouble with the law. A girl may go out and possibly get herself pregnant so she can get out of the house."
