No Rating: film has not been reviewed by the National Catholic Office for Motion Pictures (formerly the Legion of Decency). N.B. Before A-3 classification was established, A-2 indicated morally unobjectionable for adults.

Glen Campbell: Y'all Come Back, Hear

The musical instruments utilized by the performers of the Summer Brothers Smothers Show are a pretty good indication of the brand of entertainment that is dispersed.

On Sunday night's program, the last in the replacement series, the ear was treated to the sounds of the five-stringing banjo, the electric guitar, the auto harp, the bass viol and the jew's-harp among other musical instruments.

The tunes rendered were another giveaway. If "Gentle on My Mind" and "By the Time I Get to Phoenix" can now be heard on every pop station on radio, you can be certain the following seldom are "Darlin'" (compilation), "Time to Travel On," "In Them Old Cotton Fields Back Home," "Walking Machine," "Christopher Robin," "Cimarron Roll On" and the "Soul of Man Never Dies."

To sing them were such entertainers as Johnny Harford, the Stoneman Family Singers, Tennessee Three and one of the respected creators of Western and Country music, Johnny Cash.

As those who've been following the program since it made its debut in early summer know, the show, however, really belongs to that fair-haired boy, Glen Campbell, who came to the attention of the nation proper when he began singing his "Gentle on My Mind" and "By the Time I Get to Phoenix" for the late night show audiences.

Campbell, a wholesome-looking, neatly dressed young man with a most pleasant voice and manner is very easy to take in hour stretches, even for those who can't tell an Edly Arnold from a Hank Snow.

Like Arnold and country singer Jimmy Dean, both of whom have made it as big on television as any one in their specialized world of music, Campbell dishes out sophistication and folksiness in equal proportions which obviously has endeared him to what would normally be opposing factions among the listening audience.

As host of the summer replacement show he also managed to incorporate the talents of presidential as-

pirant Pat Paulson and pseudo-hippie Leigh French both of whom are seen regularly on the Smothers Brothers hour during the main season.

But Campbell's real mission has been to present country music in prime time and make the national audience enjoy it.

Apparently he succeeded for there were those among his viewers who decided that they enjoyed the replacement more than the original.

And that is a particular honor especially when other replacement shows of the summer fared so miserably, notably the "Goldiggers" and "Dom DeLuise."
