

CYO Membership Drive Scheduled Sept. 16-30

Physical exercise for the downtown layman and opportunities to provide recreation and physical education for Rochester's needy boys and girls are the attractive inducements of this year's Catholic Youth Organization annual membership campaign.

The drive, running from Sept. 16 through 30, is being guided by Mrs. Donald (Judy) Bardell and Dr. David Springett. Dr. Springett is employed at Xerox and lives at 784 Oakridge Dr., Irondequoit. Mrs. Bardell, 190 Rock Beach Rd., Irondequoit, is active as chairman of the Irondequoit Harvest Queen Program and as a member of the Federation of Women's Clubs.

All 25 members of the Board of Directors of the CYO have engaged in the promotion of the campaign and overall direction of the drive is being handled by Paul Schmidt, Executive Secretary of the Catholic Youth Organization.

A special appeal is going out to downtown laymen to enjoy the exercise facilities at the CYO's newly remodelled Midtown Men's and Women's Health Club. Among the additions to the club are new jogging track, Businessmen's Lounge, and a multi-purpose room with ping-pong and pool tables and an archery and golf range. Also new are sauna baths, showers and exercise machines.

Special appeals have been made to civic and fraternal organizations to sponsor disadvantaged children for the CYO. Through the sponsorship program, a donation of \$15 will give one needy youngster the opportunity to experience a

The Membership Campaign will be launched in three phases, with kick-off lunches for each:

1. A Renewal Campaign for current members and sponsorship renewals, headed by Adrian M. Hanna and Roger T. Bunce will begin on Monday, Sept. 23, with lunch at the CYO Board Room in the Columbus Civic Center.
2. A New Membership Campaign, headed by Daniel Mooney and Lawrence J. Oberlies

and designed to mobilize a task force to solicit membership of businessmen and women in the midtown business area, will begin with lunch on Monday, Sept. 16, at the Columbus Civic Center.

3. A Sponsor A Disadvantaged Child Campaign will begin with lunch on Wednesday, Sept. 18, again in the Board Room of the Columbus Civic Center.

For such a massive and worthwhile program many volunteers are urgently needed. As Bishop Sheen has said: "In the Church where charity reigns there fittingly should be those who sweat for love and not for reward. To volunteer for the service of youth is to put faith in practice and to add body to soul; you thus fulfill the words of Scripture that we should offer our bodies in reasonable service to the Lord."

The Catholic Youth Organization will offer scuba diving and lifesaving instruction this fall, both in co-ed classes.

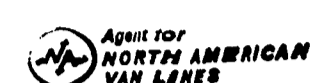
The diving course will begin this Monday, Sept. 16, at 7 p.m. and continue on Mondays for eight weeks.
