

St. Ann's Home Readies 'Day Service'

In an effort to be of greater service to the elderly in the Rochester area, St. Ann's Home will begin a Day Service Monday, Nov. 4.

The new program will allow older people to be accepted for special activities on a daily basis, while continuing to live in their own homes. They will spend two or three days a week sharing some of the home's programs and facilities as well as participating in their own programs.

According to Sister Marion, director of social services at St. Ann's, "Day Service participants will use such areas as the chapel and library and will be able to visit their friends and former neighbors who might now be residents of the home."

Sister Marion continued: "This kind of service is a new concept for homes like St. Ann's, where only a limited number of older persons can be accepted as residents. Persons wishing to enter the home eventually can find through Day Service both companionship and meaningful activity and become so satisfied with this new project that they may wish to remain in their own homes longer and continue in Day Services rather than be admitted to the home on a permanent basis."

"The closest we know to this type of program," Sister Marion said, "is in Toronto, Canada."

for the Aging in Rochester began a similar program in September. According to Mrs. Lorraine Woodbury, director, the program there is more to aid the prospective resident to adjust to the environment of the home. "We admit peo-

ple from our waiting list. We presently have 12 people enrolled and can plan on having 20," she said.

Farren Joins Courier As Associate Editor

Arthur P. Farren, Rochester, a former reporter for the Courier-Journal, last week rejoined the diocesan newspaper as an associate editor.

Father Richard Torney, Courier editor, said Farren will be primarily responsible for expanding diocesan news coverage "so that the paper will be more closely identified with the many activities occurring in the Church and among the religious and people of God throughout the 12 counties of the Diocese."

Farren said he will endeavor to establish correspondents in various diocesan areas and open communication with all parish publicity committees.

He returns to the paper's staff after 13 years in Catholic fund-raising and public relations. He has headed the research department in the Rochester office of Census Management Inc., Washington, D.C., for the last two years, and for 11 years previously served as a campaign director for CMI's fund-raising division, Foley Associates, Rochester.

Former editor of a Rochester labor (AFL) newspaper and reporter for the Rochester Democrat & Chronicle, he was associated with the Courier-Journal from 1945 to 1952 before being named editor of the "Catholic Star Herald" newspaper of the Diocese of Camden, New Jersey.

For many years Farren has been associated with the group which conducts St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Ave., Rochester, where free meals and clothing are given daily to indigent men.
