

Knight Gridders Beat Kings, 14-8 Hank Aaron to Speak At Seneca Falls

McQuaid's streaking Knights hooked up with determined Bishop Kearney in Catholic League action last Sunday in the mid of Aquinas Stadium, and for the second year in a row withstood a last-ditch passing onslaught by BK's talented Jim McGrath to emerge with a 14-8 win.

The Knights will carry a 5-1 slate against explosive Cathedral Prep tonight in Erie, Pa. Kearney, now 2-2, locks horns with Cardinal Mooney, 3-2, this Sunday at Aquinas Stadium.

Following the pattern of last year's clash, McQuaid ran roughshod over the Kings in the first half to set up the win, ripping off 163 yards to Kearney's 28. The Knights also shut off Kearney's chief offensive weapon, the pass, as deep defenders Mark Welt, Mike Ryan, and Pat McCormick held the Kings to only 4 completions and 29 yards in 16 attempts for the whole game.

McQuaid had his first opportunity early in the game when linebacker Mike Magee hit McGrath in the act of passing and jolted the ball into the hands of tackle Bob Baker, who lumbered down to the Kearney 12. The Knights stalled on the 5 but inherited possession minutes later on a punt and tailback Mark Welt powered a drive which ended 10 plays later with his two-yard dash around left end for 6 points. Bob Thomas added the first of his two soccer-style conversions.

The Kings replied early in the second quarter, penetrating

to McQuaid's 20-yard line, but the Knights refused to yield further and took over on their 25. In a few minutes McQuaid was knocking at Kearney's door, following flanker Ned Roland's 43-yard gain on a reverse. A pass interference call in the end zone moved the ball to the 9, from where Gary Gianforti lobbed a TD pass to tight end John Oraveo for McQuaid's decisive score.

The third stanza marked a Kearney resurgence as an assault of counter and draw plays caught McQuaid flat-footed. Soph halfback Tom Snyder culminated a 40-yard BK march with a one-yard buck to paydirt, but Jim Leone's PAT try was wide, leaving the count at 14-6.

The Kings really put the pressure on seconds later, recovering a kickoff fumble on McQuaid's 14, but Magee forced another Kearney fumble on the 1 and Thornton recovered. Kearney's fired-up defenders wouldn't budge, though. As Nick Combs tried to punt out from the end zone, Keith Roeder batted the ball back to him and he was nailed for a safety.

Magee's interception stopped Kearney's next drive at McQuaid's 37, and the teams traded the ball back and forth in the final period until BK finally mounted a drive with 5:00 to play. But the Knights dug in at their own 30 and stopped 4 last-minute pass attempts, including one which McCormick just barely nudged from the arms of Dennis Fitzpatrick in the end zone.

Irish Blank Mooney, Meet Auburn Next

Rich Russo, a 16-year-old junior halfback, led an aroused Aquinas Institute football team to a 26-0 victory over Cardinal Mooney High School last Sunday before some 9,000 fans at Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

Russo charged through the Mooney line for hunks of yardage all through the wet, chilly afternoon and crashed into paydirt twice. John Amante added the extra points by placements.

After a scoreless first quarter, Aquinas opened up a 7-0 lead seconds into the second quarter when Russo climaxed a 38-yard drive by streaking over from the eight. Midway through the quarter Russo struck again, cutting loose and speeding 39 yards to a touchdown.

Bob DiNicola and John Brophy each accounted for tallies in the second half, to put the game on ice for the Little Irish.

The Mooneymen, out rushed 308 yards to 0, could not get their aerial attack going. They made good on only five of 15 passes for 11 yards while Aquinas hit on two of three heaves for 66 yards. The Irish rolled up 18 first downs to Mooney's one.

Russo, who accounted for 201 yards rushing for Aquinas in 32 carries, returned to action for the Mooney fray after sitting out the previous week's game against McQuaid.

Mooney is now 3 and 2 on the season and 0-1 in Catholic League play. Aquinas is 2-4 overall.

Tonight the Maroons of Auburn, bent on revenge for last year's 40-0 defeat, host the Little Irish. Rochester fans will be particularly interested to see how well Aquinas fares against the only team this season to beat McQuaid.

"Auburn will have the size and power to sock against us," Aquinas coach Bob Rosmarino said today. "If our starters hold their own while they're in there, I'll be pleased."

Bob Adams, in his second year as head grid coach for the Auburn Maroons, is blessed with an exceptionally fine backfield, consisting of co-captains John Lombardo and Tom Blair, and Howie Richardson.
