

Aquinas, Kearney Square Off

Coach Bob Rosmarino and his Aquinas footballers wind up their grid season Sunday afternoon when the Little Irish take on the Bishop Kearney Kings at Aquinas Memorial Stadium. Game time is 2 p.m.

The Kings, coached by ex-Aquinas football star Dan Coughlin, will be out to avenge last year's 19-0 defeat. Aquinas will hope to even its season record at 4-4.

Playing one of its finest games of the season, Aquinas rolled over stubborn Auburn 28-14 last Friday in Auburn. The Little Irish, forced to full throttle by a defensively sharp Maroon eleven, had to fight feverishly for every inch of

ground gained. What Auburn lacked in offensive sparkle, it made up for with a rock-ribbed defense.

Four Aquinas players scored touchdowns, while kicking specialist John Amente made good on all four conversion attempts.

Mike Skivington with 20 carries for 100 yards, was the top

Irish ball-carrier, but Greg Dolan added 85 yards in 16 carries. Rich Russo, who sat out the second half, gained 42 yards in 9 carries.

After a 7-7 halftime tie, Aquinas exploded for three touchdowns in the second half. Quarterback Dan Frank put Aquinas on the scoreboard first with a 10-yard run. Howie

Richardson tied it up with a 13-yard run following an Aquinas fumble.

John Brophy plunged one yard early in the third period to put Aquinas ahead for keeps. Greg Dolan scattered five yards to make it 21-7 in the last quarter. Frank hit Chuck Placito in the end zone with a 9-yard pass to end the Irish scoring. In the closing second of play Bernie Newcomb crashed over from the three for an Auburn TD following a 43-yard pass play from Newcomb to Richardson.

Defensive honors of the day went to Aquinas linebacker George Barberi, who got 6 tackles and 6 assists.

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McQuaid Bows to Erie Prep

A 7-6 halftime lead wasn't enough to withstand a second-half passing barrage by Erie Prep's Pat Steenberge last Friday night, and McQuaid's football Knights came away from Pennys with a 19-7 loss, their second in seven games.

The Knights have this weekend off, then go after their first Catholic league football crown in the season finale against Cardinal Mooney on Nov. 17.

McQuaid was rocked back by a quick Erie drive from the opening kickoff but got organized and controlled the ball for most of the first half. Steenberge, after his opening flurry of completions, had been held reasonably well in check, and

the Knights' second-half strategy was to control the ball, try to score again, and force Erie into long pass patterns. All went well for five minutes of the third period, and then the key break occurred.

Nick Corbbs, back to punt on his own 30, got a bad snap from center, chased the ball back to the 10, and wound up being tackled on the 18. From close range, Steenberge was unstoppable, and his 4-yard completion to Chuck Britton 3 plays later put Prep ahead to stay.

Britton was the favorite target on Erie's clinching score early in the last quarter, taking 4 passes as the homesters drove 69 yards in 7 plays. It was McQuaid's turn to take to the air

then and the Knights did manage to get to Erie's 25 and again to the 8 as the game ended, with John Oravec doing some fancy pass-catching.

Statistically, it was Steenberge's game. The 6-foot-1 senior, rated by McQuaid coach Tom Seymour as the best high school quarterback he's seen, completed 22 of 40 passes for 283 yards, scrambled well when he couldn't pass, and got off 3 booming punts. For McQuaid, Mark Welt scored the lone TD on a 1-yard sweep and Bob Thomas made it 5-for-5 with his soccer-style conversions. Swing-back Ned Roland was the Knights' top gainer, with 91 yards on 14 carries.

Mooney Captures Cross-Country Crown

Anyone who regards cross-country as a rather predictable sport had his notion shattered last Saturday at St. John Fisher campus where a determined Cardinal Mooney squad upset three Catholic league rivals to capture its first diocesan championship.

The Cards had lost all three dual meets in CL competition, 24-32 to Kearney, 26-31 to Aquinas, and 22-35 to McQuaid. They had little or no chance to take the crown away from all three of their conquerors. But Brother Donald's up-and-coming runners did just that, nipping Aquinas and McQuaid, 46-48 and finishing far ahead of league champion Kearney's 76 points.

Signaling the Cards' upsurge was the first-place finish of sophomore Bill Robinson, who reversed an earlier defeat this season by second-placer Mike D'Errico of Kearney. Robinson's time for the windy 1 1/2

miles was a good 13:46. Completing the Mooney scoring was Andy Boehm in 5th, Ben Smith in 10th, Steve Westland in 13th, and Larry Muir in 17th.

Aquinas all but won the meet with its front four of Jack Dess(3), Bill Fox(6), Jim Crawford(7), and Paul Ford(8), but went all the way back to 24th place for its fifth scorer. McQuaid, led by Phil Horton in 4th place, grouped the rest of its squad between 9th and 14th to finish a close third. Kearney, with its dependable 23 of Jeff Elchner and John Terrieri both having sub-par days, had to settle for first place trophies in the meet's other two divisions.

The Kings won a narrow 39-42 edge over Mooney in the junior varsity race with a team of Dick Kupferschmid(5), Tom Walsh(6), Dave Aman(8), Darryl Youngman(9), and Bob Perrotta(11). Individual winner was Mooney's Bob Curtis, who

led all the way and wound up 30 yards in front of McQuaid's Pat Cullinane.

In the freshman race, Kearney surprised a favored McQuaid team and dumped the Knights, 37-43. McQuaid had the first two places with Dwight Larimer and Greg Smith, but the Kings came on strong to win with Marty Law-

son(3), Kevin Hanns(4), John Wille(9), Vic Annis(10), and Tom O'Connell(11).

The victorious Mooney varsity moves on now to this Saturday's All-Catholic interdiocesan Meet at R.I.T. where they'll represent Rochester, along with Aquinas' foursome, two men from McQuaid, and one from Kearney.

Kearney Booters End Season; Record 12-4

The Bishop Kearney soccer team beat Aquinas 3-2, and lost to Churchville-Chill, 2-1, and Eastridge, 1-0, as it finished its season with a 60 record in the Catholic League to take the title, and a 12-4 overall record.

Against Aquinas, Dave Tomotto made a direct kick good at 5:39 of the first quarter. Jerry Kilzak scored at 7:10, assisted by Paul Williams and Ray D'Agostino. Tribestone narrowed the margin with a direct kick that sailed over the Kearney defensive wall into the net at 7:30 of the third quarter. Jerry Kilzak scored his second tally of the game at 14:35 of the third quarter. Dave Tomotto and Rocky Meyers received assists. Kearney goalie Len Schantz was replaced in the first quarter after making two saves, by Dick Rohde. Rohde stopped 11 shots.

At Churchville-Chill, CC's MacDonald scored at 2:27 of the first quarter. Larry Rogers tied

the game for the Kings at 4:35 of the same quarter while Dan Maharer and Paul Williams assisted on the score. Shaffer scored the winning point at 7:53 of the second quarter.

In a tight contest, Dave Siconolfi booted home the game winner for Eastridge at 4:06 of the third quarter. While Kearney goalie Len Schantz made eleven saves, the Kings had numerous scoring opportunities, but failed to get the ball into their opponents' net.

Aquinas Band To Perform In Philadelphia

Aquinas Institute's Marching Band will be among 10 of the nation's top high school marching bands to perform tomorrow (Nov. 9) in Philadelphia's Civic Center Convention Hall.

The "Parade of Champions" will have as its host the Cardinal Dougherty High School Band in conjunction with the Civic Center. The annual attraction has drawn the most honored and most consistent band winners in the country and is considered one of the outstanding band festivals in the nation.

The host band, Cardinal Dougherty, is defending champion of the World Marching Band Competition, a title won in Kerkrade, Holland.

The Aquinas Band is directed by Nicholas Cattat.

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Cardinals 11 Defeats Kearney, 26-19

Bishop Kearney suffered its second loss in Catholic League action last Sunday when it lost to Cardinal Mooney, 26-19. The Kings are now 0-2 in league action while Mooney has balanced their record at 1 and 1.

Kearney was first to score in the third period when quarter-

back Jim McGrath bulled the ball over from the one. But CM came right back to match the Kings as Pat Butler scored his second touchdown.

Tom Snyder put six more on the board for BK in the final quarter on a 2-yard plunge. An inside kick by Kearney's Jim Leone resulted in a Mooney fumble and the Kings were still alive. McGrath marched his team 45 yards to score BK's final touchdown.

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
