



### Proposed St. Paul's Church in Webster

Architects' rendering depicts proposed multi-purpose building for the new St. Paul's Parish, Webster. Two-floor structure will have mid-level entrances leading to church (designed to seat 450) and two classrooms on upper floor and four classrooms and kitchen on lower floor. Father John T. ## 200 Sisters to Probe 'Urban Crisis' at St. Agnes Workshop

More than 200 Sisters from religious communities throughout the Diocese will probe the "urban crisis" at a day-long Urban-Suburban Workshop on Saturday, Nov. 23, in St. Agnes High School.

Scheduled from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., the talks and panel discussions will feature 19 panel participants.

Sponsoring the program is the joint Office of Urban Ministry of the Rochester Diocese and the Area Council of Churches. It will be opened at 9 a.m. with registration, followed at 9:20 with a slide film presentation by Gene DePrez—a documentary on the housing crisis.

At 10:30 a.m. a series of talks will be keynoted by the Rev. Franklin Florence, president of Fight organization. Summertime at 3:30 p.m. will be Father P. David Fink, diocesan vicar for urban ministry.

At 1 p.m. five panel discussions

will be held through out the building, and these will be repeated at 2:15 p.m. This will allow the Sisters to attend two of the five sessions. They include:

More than 100 persons heard speakers from "inner city" groups at the last of seven weekly seminars staged by the Catholic Interracial on Sunday night in St. John the Evangelist's School hall, Humboldt Street.

John Walker, Better Rochester Living, Rolf Zerges, Rochester Neighbors, Mrs. Alyce Friend, Rochester School Volunteer Program, Mrs. Alice Salzberg, Metro-Act (Friends of Fight), Harry Gold, Area Youth Ministry-Risk Institute, Michael Loisinger.

Paul W. Brayer, CIC president, termed the seven meetings potentially successful—only if participants had learned enough about "black-white" problems to "shed the Christmas basket mentality and really become involved on a day-to-day basis in some aspect of racial activity."

He announced that the CIC is continuing its membership drive and hopes to undertake another series of seminars in the spring.

### Teach-ins Planned On Methods of Teaching Religion

Methods of teaching religion to youngsters will be outlined at five-hour "teach-ins" Sunday, Nov. 24, in Rochester, Corning and Ithaca.

Designed particularly for priests, Sisters and Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) personnel, the meetings are scheduled from 4 to 9 p.m. at St. Michael's, Rochester, St. Patrick's, Corning, and Immaculate Conception, Ithaca.

Talks and panel discussions are based principally on the "Come to the Father" textbooks now in use in nearly 100 parochial schools and in many CCD programs.

Similar "teach-ins" focused particularly toward instruction of pupils in elementary grades on through four, are slated Dec. 1 in Rochester and Auburn, Dec. 8 in Avon and Newark, and Dec. 15 in Rochester.

Participants will be charged \$1 admission and are asked to bring a box lunch.

## Msgr. Joseph Grady Dies at 82; Educator

A funeral Mass was celebrated Monday morning in St. Mary's Church for Msgr. Joseph E. Grady who died Thursday, Nov. 14 at St. Ann's Home. He was 82.

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen was principal concelebrant with Msgr. James McAniff, Msgr. Leslie Whelan, Father Joseph Brennan, Father John Redington, and Msgr. Leo Smith, the only surviving member of Msgr. Grady's ordination class.

Bishop Sheen preached the sermon. Burial took place in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Msgr. Grady served 29 years as vice rector at St. Bernard's Seminary before retiring in 1968.

A native Rochesterian who was ordained in June 1916 at St. Patrick's Cathedral, here, Msgr. Grady devoted his entire priestly career to teaching.

Before his 1937 appointment to St. Bernard's, Msgr. Grady was principal of Aquinas Institute and before that, of the old Cathedral High School.

He succeeded the late Msgr. William Byrne as Aquinas principal in 1928 and served until 1937, when the Basilian Fathers took over operation of the school.

In addition to his priestly duties, Msgr. Grady served in other civic and humanitarian roles. For 30 years he was a member of the Rochester Public Library board of trustees, serving two years as its president.

He also was a board member of the Rochester School for the Deaf.

The monsignor celebrated his golden jubilee with a Mass, May 28, 1968 at the St. Bernard's Seminary chapel and was honored on the occasion by a dinner with faculty and students.

On June 9 of that year his grammar school classmates paid him honor at a reunion dinner at the University Club for the Class of 1905 of Immaculate Conception School.

Msgr. Grady was a graduate of St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries and has MA and LLD degrees.

Following his ordination in 1916 he taught at the Rochester Division of Niagara University and during summers at Notre Dame and Fordham universities.

He assisted in parish work at St. Patrick's Cathedral, St. Mary's, St. Jerome's in East Rochester, and St. Louis in Pittsford.

## Two Towers Called Symbolic

Two neighboring towers in Rochester's mid-city were linked recently by Bishop James E. Kearney as dramatizing the "significant intimacy" of Rochester's long spiritual and material progress.

The Bishop referred to the tower of St. Joseph's Church on Franklin Street and that of Sibley's department store a half block away.

Retired Bishop Kearney was honored guest Nov. 10 at the 10th annual Communion and Interfaith breakfast of Sibley employees in the store's restaurant. The breakfast highlighted two current centennial observances—those of the Sibley store and the Rochester Diocese.

On behalf of the Diocese, the Bishop received the store's centennial award.

Father Robert F. McNamara, diocesan historian, was principal speaker. He briefly sketched the 10-decade history of the Diocese, selecting for discussion three areas—Catholic community contribution—the defense of the nation, Americanization of immigrants and advances in social and interracial welfare.

He also noted that the current year marks the centennial of another nearby establishment—Scrantom's Book & Stationery Store, Main Street East.

Guests included the Very Rev. John Clerkin, CSSR, rector of St. Joseph's Church, and representatives of the Protestant and Jewish communities.
