According to Nietopski, the four schools in the league, Aquinas, McQuaid, Bishop Kearney and Cardinal Mooney, can no longer afford trips to such cities as Utica, Watertown, Olean, etc.; and they can no longer afford the guarantees which these out-of-town schools demand in order to play in Rochester.

McQuaid 5 Promising

McQuaid Coach Ed Markey has a promising manpower situation as he begins his second season with the Knights in a home opener against Edison this Saturday.

Gone from last year's 12-9 club are starters Kevin Dwyer and Brad Smith, but three key men are back: top scorer and rebounder Nick Combs, a 6-4 senior, and a pair of quick 5-10 guards in seniors John Connolly and Bob Madden. Added to that nucleus are three more seniors and a raft of junior talent from last year's 16-2 junior varsity squad.

With Connolly and Madden set in backcourt, the two remaining spots will likely wind up with the taller contenders on the squad. These include Combs' brother Tom, a 6-4 junior; 6-1 senior Mark Welt, who saw a good deal of action last year as a rebounder; 6-2 junior Joe Cook, and a pair of 6-1 juniors, John McLane and John Quinlisk.

If the situation calls for speed and ball-handling rather than height, the Knights have seniors Gregg Moss and Tim Bergin and juniors Ned Miller, Mike Ryan, and Ray O'Neill, the latter two among the best shooters on the team.

Whichever combination Markey opens with, he seems assured of a strong bench once his new varsity players acquire some experience.

The Knights' schedule this season shows one new rival and a new tournament. A consistently good Arcade-Central team will come to McQuaid on Jan. 3, while the Corning Christmas Tournament replaces the Jesuit Tournament on the Knights' vacation swing.

Aquinas Hopes for Big Season

Aquinas Institute, which has the habit of coming up with tough basketball teams, opened its 38th consecutive basketball season last Wednesday against the East Rochester Bombers.

Although at this writing the season has not yet begun, it looks like this year could be another big one for Coach Jerry McGuire and his Little Irish club.

Most of last year's fine team has graduated, but McGuire is counting upon several up-and-coming players to bring the Irish the Diocesan title this winter.

The prime reason for Aquinas' optimism is Bob Christian, a driving, ball-hawking senior who, at 5-foot-6 is the shortest man on the team.

"Bob is going to surprise a few people," says McGuire, who is in his second year as varsity coach at Aquinas. "He has improved an awful lot over last season. He's strong and fast."

In addition to Christian, six other seniors are back from last season and all are battling for starting berths. Jerry Sussina, a good shooter and a big rebounder and Bill Woodward, a consistent player, seem to have the inside track for the forward position.

Jerry Lasponara, 6-2, is certain to start at center. Other seniors include Bill Murrer, Dan Frank, Mike Kennedy. A contingent of juniors and sophomores also figure in McGuire's plans this season. Included are Peter Schlachter, Kevin McMillen and Steve Centron from the juniors and sophomore Tom Roilwing.

"On paper, this team doesn't have much varsity experience," says McGuire. "But, I like what I've seen so far. The height is good, the shooting is good and the speed is there."

Aquinas plays a 17-game schedule including two holiday tournaments.

Bishops Foresee Indian Church

New Delhi, India—(NC)—The Indian hierarchy looks to a forthcoming national seminar on the application of Vatican Council II teachings to this country for a breakthrough in Church renewal.

A pastoral letter on the seminar, scheduled to be held next May, said the Church in India should be so fully integrated into Indian life as to become thoroughly Indian not only in externals, but in its way of thinking and feeling.

"The Church in India, then, if it is to be true to its essential mission, must be a church rooted in Indian soil, thoroughly at home in her various languages, culture and way of life, intimately sharing the joys and hopes, griefs and anxieties of the Indian people and acknowledged by them not as foreign but as very much their own," the bishops said.

Msgr. Zryd, Rome College Head, Dies

Rome—(NC)—Msgr. Joseph L. Zryd, superior of the graduate department of Rome's North American College, died Nov. 19 following what had been a routine surgical operation.

Msgr. Zryd, a priest of the diocese of Marquette, Mich., was 65. He came to the graduate department as spiritual director in 1960 from Marquette, where he had been vicar general and pastor of St. Michael's church.
