Parish Optimistic on School's Future

The people of Christ the King Parish learned Sunday that their attitudes toward their parish school contradict national reports of growing fatalism toward the parochial school system.

An analysis of the parishioners' opinions on the values of the CCD program and the parish school of 470 children was presented at Sunday Masses.

On Oct. 21, the parish school board sent out a questionnaire to the 1038 envelope users in the parish to evaluate, among other things, factors affecting the decision whether to send children to public or to parochial schools.

Of the 50 per cent who answered, most send their children to parochial school because moral values, discipline, and religious values are stressed there, the survey showed.

The factors which were said to militate against parochial school enrollment were the large number of lay teachers, distance of school from home and the personal evaluation of the quality of Catholic education.

Most often, parishioners' evaluation of the quality of Catholic education came from personal previous experiences with the Catholic school system.

The report on the survey states that 43 per cent of the parents of CCD students would transfer their children to the parochial school if class sizes were smaller, if educational quality were higher and if their child would be admitted.

The report stated further

that 91 per cent of the parents approved of the CCD program, with changes suggested in curriculum, in having the Sisters teach, in changing class days and allowing for more hours of class a week.

According to the report, 85 per cent of parish school parents approved of the parochial school system. They desired, however, their children to have smaller classes, physical education, music and arts, ungraded classes, more science, better qualified teachers and better marking systems.

A number of parishioners suggested that tuition be charged and 70 replied that they wanted festivals to raise funds for education.

One parishioner wrote: "We feel that Catholic schools are, and always have been, private schools and therefore tuition should be charged. . . it is almost impossible for the whole parish to foot the bill."

Father William J. Schifferli, pastor of Christ the King, said: "We don't want to give the idea that every thing is roses and honey (for the Catholic school system) but we feel that the reported pessimism has been over emphasized."

Priests and people of Christ the King, Father Schifferli went on to say, are confident that the parochial school system can be maintained for the present.
