Acc-runner Dick Buerkle is a 21-year old Rochesterian who studies languages at Villanova University. He is 5 feet, 7 inches and weighs only 128 pounds. He has the slight and spindly look of many other runners.

But when he goes against them in competition the resemblance ends — and all they see of Dick Buerkle is elbows and heels.

Buerkle came home for Thanksgiving this year and with him a handsome scroll signifying the greatest accomplishment of his career, a citation naming him an All-American.

Father Donald McCarthy, track coach at Aquinas, points with pride to Buerkle's name engraved on the school's all-time track records. No one has broken Dick's record of 4:23 for the mile run set in 1965, and according to Father McCarthy, no one is about to.

Aquinas Athletic Director Father Cyril Carter recalled that Buerkle used to train as he runs, with a Trappist monk's fervor. His punishing regimen included running every day over the most difficult footing he could find, through the rub-

ble-strewn woods behind the Aquinas campus and along the lumpy railway roadbed near the stadium. The worse the weather was, the harder he trained.

"It was worth every effort!" said Buerkle as he recalled his 8:46 finish in this year's Penn Relays, sort of the world series of track. Villanova, with a strong assist from Buerkle, won the title handily.

Buerkle is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Buerkle of Hurstbourne Road in St. James parish. After graduation from Villanova in June he hopes to continue his studies at Oxford University in England.

McQuaid Surprised By West High, 67-51

A fast, hot-shooting West High five, coming off an opening games defeat to Edison the night before, bounced back with a stunning 67-51 upset of McQuaid last Saturday at the pocket-sized West court.

The loss was the first for Coach Ed Markey's Knights, who had downed Edison by 23 points a week previously. This Saturday Madison will be the third city squad to test the Knights in an 8:15 game at McQuaid.

Against West, McQuaid led only once, at 5-4 on a bucket by Tom Combs. West was ahead by 17-15 after one period and three quick second-quarter baskets sent the homesters off to a 29-22 lead. At the start of the third quarter, West again surged with three quickies, taking command by 35-22.

McQuaid was still down, 46-36, going into the last quarter, but a tip-in by Ray O'Neill, two jumpers by John Connolly, and a pair of foul shots by Nick Combs brought the Knights charging back to within 46-44 with 6 minutes to play.

West fired back, though, with two corner jumpers by Jim Harris, and the Occidentals broke away to a 57-44 bulge as McQuaid went scoreless for the next 3 1/2 minutes.

Tyrone McDaniels paced the winners with 22 points while Harris and John Valenti backed him up strongly with 18 and 12. For the Knights, Nick Combs

Thomas O. James, college treasurer, said a tentative \$2 million loan from the U.S. Department of Housing and Development has been given final approval.

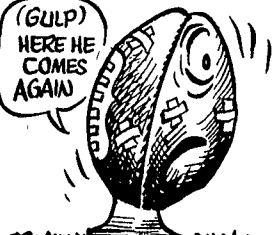
