Peace Day Sermon

We're All in the War Business

London-Everyone who pays taxes directly or indirectly is "deeply and personally involved in the war business," the congregation in Westminster cathedral here was told in a Peace Sunday sermon.

Have you got a pair of Bren guns or a box of grenades in your back room?" asked Msgr. Bruce Kent, reason why you shouldn't have, since every man, woman and child in this country spent about 35 pounds (\$84) each on armaments last year.

"Today our country spends two billion pounds (\$4.1 billion) each year on the swords of the 20th century; 900 million pounds (\$2,160 million) on beer and only 150 million pounds (\$360 million) is lent or given to the poor countries of the world, our brothers in Christ . . .

"Peace is so much more than the condemnation of certain modes of behavior. It is not the silent tension of the arms race. It is not the cowing of small nations into silence with economic pressure. It is not the passivity of us in the West who enjoy the good life and are happy with things as they are. Christian peace starts with love for the whole community.

British Isles are being asked in parish appeals to maké an unprecedented drive in the next 12 months to reduce the poverty gap between the rich "Atlantic nations" and the relatively poor countries of the

Appeals were made in some 2.500 parishes in England and Wales and in the 700 parishes in Scotland. The Irish bishops have already issued of Pope Paul.

Leading the work in the British branch of the Vatican Commission for World Justice and Peace are a group of internationally known experts on population, economics, world trade and sociology. They include Barbara Ward, the Catholic economist, and George Bull, editor of the influential business and financial magazine here, the Director.

They are asking Catholics to fast or go without luxuries and give the money instead to one of the recognized groups dedicated to overseas aid; mobilize public opinion, pressure politicians to help the poor countries; hold meetings to which foreigners should be invited to get to know world problems; work for harmony inside the home and the community and in this way spread national and international harmony.

New York - (RNS) - Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, Mayor John Lindsay and Manhattan Borough President Percy Sutton here signed petitions asking the federal government to declare Jan. 15, the birth date of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, as a national holiday.

Petitions were signed immediately before a memorial service to the slain civil rights leader at the City Hall. Earlier, a group of 75 to 100 clergymen of all traditions marched up Broadway to the City Hall from Trinity (Episcopal) church.

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference, which Dr. King headed, is sponsoring the drive to have his birth date made a holiday.

Meanwhile in Washington, D.C., Rep. John Conyers (D.-Mich.) introduced bills in the House of Representatives to declare Jan. 15 a holiday and to have 50-cent King me morial coins minted.

The Negro lawmaker had introduced similar bills in the last sesson of Congress. He said he had 56 co-sponsors in the previous effort and would again seek supporters to introduce a companion bill in the

Key West, Fla. — (NC) — When Tennessee Williams entered the Catholic Church, he followed the examof his brother, Edward Dakin Williams, who became a Catholic in India during World War II.

After he was received into the Church by Father Joseph LeRoy, S.J. curate at St. Mary Star of the Sea Church here, the Pulitzer Prize winning playwright summed up his feelings by saying: "I've been a Catholic all my life."

Edward Williams visited the church rectory (Jan. 5) and requested that a priest visit his brother.

Father LeRoy said: "He had been very ill with Hong Kong flu in a New York hospital and came down here to recuperate." The priest visited the playwight over the next five days for instructions. Williams was received into the Church on Jan. 10.

Williams and his brother had been Episcopalians. Their grandfather was an Episcopalian clergyman.

At his request the 54-year-old playwright was baptized with full ceremonies which included recitation of

the profession of faith, after which he received first Communion under both species. His brother was his god-

Orthodox Patriarch Athenagoras I and accord between their two Churches are stronger than ever, but that there is a need to make these bonds stronger in 1969.


The Patriarch's expression of brotherhood came in a Christmas message to the Pope which has just been published in the Vatican City daily, L'Osservatore Romano.


"We are now on the threshold of the New Year and realize that the time is now begoming ever more. short in consideration of the very rapid evolution of the world around

the Pope that in 1969 he would be "ready to be at your side," so that they could "open together new ways which can lead to the complete fulfillment of the Lord's will."


