Cardinals Beat Knights for 10-0 Tally

Cardinal Mooney's polished basketballers kept their poise in the face of their stiffest challenge this season and finally escaped McQuaid's packed gym last Friday night with a close 41-30 victory over the Knights.

It was the tenth triumph in a row for the Cardinals, who now hold first place in the Catholic League with a 3-0 mark. McQuaid, playing without injured star Nick Combs, suffered its fifth setback in eleven decisions and its first to a CL opponent.

This Saturday night, a tough Franklin team comes to McQuaid fresh from a big win over Monroe.

A sudden scoring eruption midway through the second half provided Mooney with its winning margin. Pete Castle's three-point play at the third

quarter buzzer gave the Cards a 25-20 lead, their biggest since early in the game. After the teams traded buckets at the start of the final period, Doug Farrell hit a long jumper, Castle scored again from underneath, Farrell connected on a drive, and Dick Felber and Terry Meagher each added a pair of free throws for a 37-22 margin with 4:30 to play. The Knights managed to cut the deficit to 37-27, but Mooney effectively sat on the ball to preserve that spread.

McQuaid opened the game with a very deliberate slow-down-offense, being content to work around the perimeter of Mooney's 2-3 zone, waiting for good opportunities. Mooney led anyway, 8-5, at quarter's end and jumped ahead 12-5 before a 7-point burst by the Knights evened things. At the half it was 18-15, Mooney, and Tom Combs' jumper almost three minutes into the third period

gave McQuaid its only lead at 17-16.

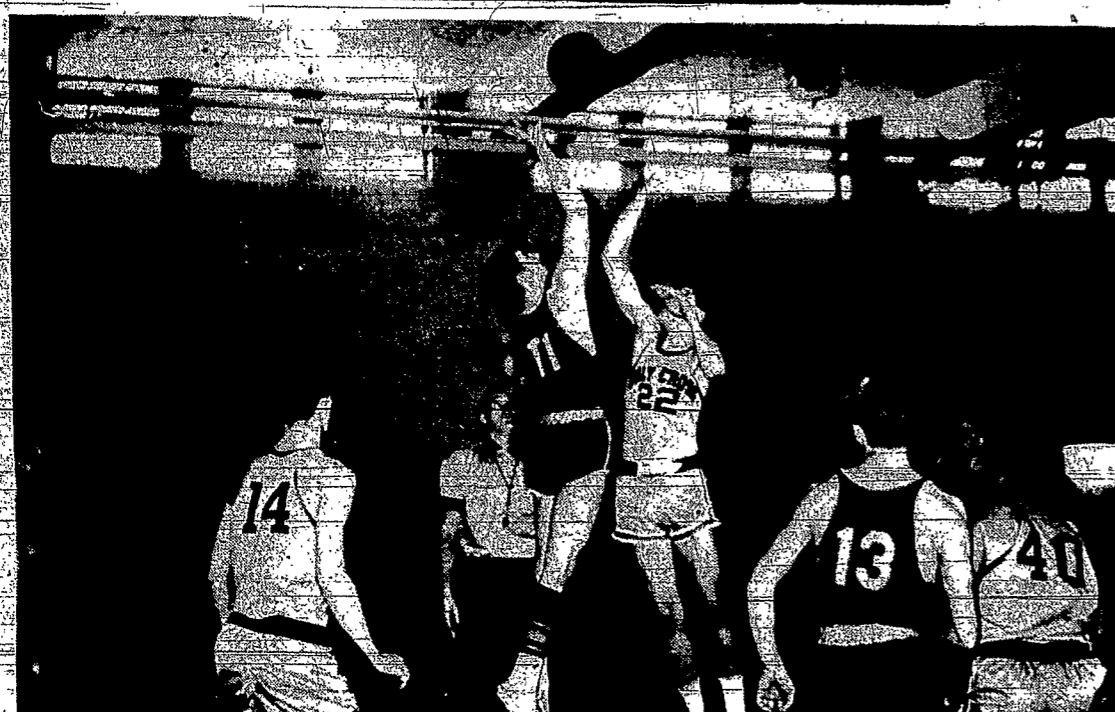
It was another fine performance for Farrell, whose 17 points plus his rebounding and ball-handling spearheaded the Mooney effort. Combs turned in 12 points for McQuaid.

The McQuaidmen didn't fluster against Mooney's harassing press and battled the taller Cards on almost even terms off the boards. But Mooney's superior foul shooting gave it a 15-8 edge to go with its one-basket advantage from the field.

McQuaid's J.V. team lost to the Cards, but the Knight freshmen evened their record at 4-4 with a 41-34 win over Mt. Car-

Fitzpatrick Paces Kearney Triumph

All season long, people have been saying Kearney's Dennis Fitzpatrick is one of the toughest schoolboy cagers around.

Six-foot-three Fitz put on another of his dynamic rebounding and shooting performances last Friday night and sparked the Kings to a come-from-behind 62-59 triumph over Aquinas Institute before a packed house in the Kearney gym.

In the last period when the game was decided Fitzpatrick was all over the floor for the Kings. It could have been his finest performance of the season.

His rebounding was superb. Every time Kearney needed the ball, Fitzpatrick got it. He's a wiry kid; all arms and legs. He doesn't overpower opponents under the hoop, just combines the right amount of finesse and bulk. He was the big reason Kearney pulled the game out.

Fitzpatrick finished with a game-high 12 rebounds. He also converted 8 of 11 shots from the foul line and made 8 field goals for a total of 24 points to lead the scoring. He received solid backing from John Myers

and Richard Yaeger who netted 13 and 10 points respectively.

Fired-up Aquinas jumped to a 17-16 lead after the first period and boosted it to 35-28 at halftime. However, Kearney came out in the second half and chipped away at the Irish lead.

Then Fitzpatrick took over—and Kearney had its 3rd victory in 9 games this season. The loss for Aquinas was its seventh against five victories.

Aquinas will concentrate on studies and midyear examinations for the next two weeks before going back into action on Feb. 1 against Madison on the old R.L.T. court.

Kearney will play Batavia High at home tomorrow night at 8. The JV game is scheduled for 7.
