When the doctor shakes his head and says Aunt Mildred cannot live alone any longer, what's to be done? She is not exactly sick, nor well either, she is a member of that ever increasing group known as the "ill well" they need some daily attention but not of the highly skilled, professional variety.

Aunt Mildred thinks traditionally of going immediately into a church sponsored home for the aged; it's what she always had in mind for herself "when the time came". She has saved for the day when she can be "near the chapel".

Unfortunately scores of other Aunt Mildreds and Uncle Hermans have had the same thought --- there is just no room for her nor is there likely to be for some time.

The bonus of longer lives given to us through the skills of medicine and research has turned into a mixed blessing. The numbers of people in quite advanced old age are increasing far more rapidly than are the facilities to accommodate them. The net result is total frustration of the aged person himself and despair for the nearest relatives who naturally cannot accommodate him.

We must invent new ways of helping the elderly to live out their lives in comfort and dignity.

In casting about for these new ways, we have become too eager to turn to government. No matter what government does to help the aged it can never be total enough, the problem is a chronic, long term one. We just cannot legislate old age or poverty out of our milieu, no matter how high the taxes rise. Certainly programs of Medicare and Medicaid have offered more care to more elderly than ever before in our history, but unless individuals and groups take initiative where government stops, Aunt Mildred is never going to live in peace.

One partial solution of where to put the person who is still well but in need of supervision, is the evolution of the supervised boarding home. This is really a smallgroup home run by individuals for profit, yet it has served well those elderly who need routine supervision and regular meals. The independence of a person is still intact — he may pursue the ac-tivities he is able to yet he has the security of supervision. But these homes are also

For this there are daily homemaking services available in this community. A highly successful effort to keep the elderly person in his own home is Meals on Wheels. This plan provides two nourishing meals per day for those who cannot prepare

their own food.

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
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
