Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten Registration Week in the public schools of Rochester will begin on March 24 and end March 28, 1969. Children who will be five years of age on or before December 1, 1969, are eligible to enter kindergarten at the opening of school in September 1969.

All children should be registered in March if their fifth birthday is on or before December 1, 1969. They should take with them a birth record or baptismal certificate, evidence of vaccination, and any other information that may be helpful to the school. The hours of registration will be 9:00-11:30 A.M., 1:00-3:30 P.M.

Four Downtown Churches Look to Roles for Future

Four downtown churches in Rochester, employing the up-to-date means of professional urban planning, counseling and videotaping processes, are involved in an extensive program to examine common problems they will face in the next two decades.

Three Presbyterian churches (Brick, Central and First) and St. Luke's Episcopal Church in a cooperative effort have each appointed a panel of seven members and three alternates to form an overall Goal Setting Committee.

Also on the committee are representatives from the Catholic Diocese, Father Charles Bennett of St. Anthony's Church; the Presbytery of Genesee Valley; the Episcopal Diocese; the Area Council of Churches and the Urban Ministry Conference, and the Downtown Ministry.

The committee has been meeting on an average of twice a week to hear two "advocates" a session since early February. Each "advocate", an expert in either a religious or secular field from outside the city, proposes a specific plan he hopes the four churches will undertake.

At the conclusion of the meetings next month, the committee will vote following a set of questions prepared by Styche and Associates of New York City, on the priority of the various proposals.

Next the committee will present its "top" proposals to the congregations of the four churches for their approval and probable cooperative effort in the future.

In a unique phase of the program each speaker is being videotaped for future discussions and for viewing by the congregations.

The advocates cover a wide range of issues as exemplified by such speakers and topics as:

Walter Klaus, music director of the Broadway United Church of New York City, "Music and Worship"; Frank Joyce, director of People Against Racism, Detroit, "A Program of Race Relations among White People in Urban and Suburban Rochester"; Dr. Richard Luecke, assistant director of Urban Training Center, Chicago, "Training Persons for Urban Service"; Education, ecumenism, housing, and the elderly are among other topics.

Dear Friends,

Next week we'll be celebrating one of our merriest holidays—St. Pat's Day. No matter that you may be German-born, Italian, Hungarian or Chinese, on that day everyone hails from the Emerald Isle. 'Tis sad but true that Corned Beef and Cabbage, that staple Irish fare, seems to be vanishing from the scene. It may be because much of the corned beef available today doesn't seem to have the same texture or taste as in the old days; not to mention the fact that cabbage is not a "status" vegetable!

But you can still "go Irish" in your meal planning for the day by using a bit of green coloring or by serving a green salad, vegetable and desserts. Here are some suggested recipes to put your family in the right mood for a St. Patrick's celebration:

IRISH SODA BREAD

(1 loaf casserole)

- 4 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 3 tbl. caraway seeds
- 1/4 cup Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1 cup light raisins
- 1 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 egg yolk

Grease a two qt. casserole. Sift flour, sugar, salt and baking powder into mixing bowl. Stir in caraway seeds. Cut in butter until the consistency of corn meal. Add raisins. Combine all remaining ingredients but the egg yolk. Stir into flour mixture until just moistened. Turn dough onto floured bread board and knead until smooth. Shape into ball. Place in casserole. With sharp knife make an X cut across the top about 1/2 in. deep. Brush with beaten egg yolk. Bake in 375 F oven for about 1 hour. Cool about fifteen minutes before removing from pan. Cool completely before slicing. Serve with Land O'Lakes Butter!

RAW APPLE CAKE

(one 9x9-in. sq. cake pan)

- 2 cups diced raw apples (cored only)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup melted Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1 beaten egg
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup nuts
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Pour sugar over apples and let stand 30 minutes. Add melted Land O'Lakes Butter and egg. Sift dry ingredients together and add to the mixture. Add nuts and vanilla. Bake 30 minutes at 350 F. Before serving, top with green-tinted whipped cream or green pistachio ice cream.

ALMOND BUTTER COOKIES

(about 7 doz. cookies)

- 6 ounces blanched almond pieces
- 1 cup (2 sticks) Land O'Lakes Butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour

Put almonds through food chopper on fine blade or chop in blender. Cream butter with sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, vanilla and almond extract. Stir in ground almonds, gradually stir in flour and food coloring. Fit snowflake pattern on cookie press. Fill with dough and press out on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 F for 12-15 minutes or until firm. Remove from cookie sheets and cool on wire racks. Decorate with green frosting and sprinkle with coconut.

Income Tax Questions

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q — If I send in my return now, how long will it take to get my refund?

A — Refund claims filed now can be processed and the check issued in 5-6 weeks. Returns filed in April take longer to process, because of the high volume of returns received at that time.

Any error on the return, such as a mistake in figuring the new tax surcharge or a missing Social Security number or signature, will cause delays. If your refund is delayed, wait at least 10 weeks from the time you filed before writing IRS about it.

Q — I collected state unemployment benefits in 1968. Do I declare them as income?

A — No, state unemployment benefits are not taxable and do not have to be reported.

Q — I support my grandson. Can I claim him as a dependent even though he did not live with me?

A — Generally, you can if you provided more than half of the child's support, and the other dependency tests are met. The dependency requirements are explained in the 1040 and 1040A tax instructions.

Q — Are scholarships taxable?

A — Scholarships and fellowship grants are tax free within certain limitations. For more details, send a post card to your District Director and ask for Publication 507, "Tax Information on Scholarships and Fellowships." General tax information for students is contained in Publication 532, "Tax Information for Students and Parents." Both are free.

Q — Do I have to report my company pension as income?

A — If the company paid the entire cost of the pension, the amounts you received usually will be fully taxable. If you paid part of the cost, only a portion of your pen-

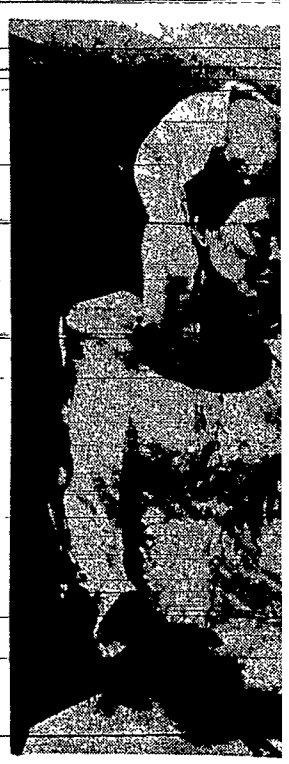

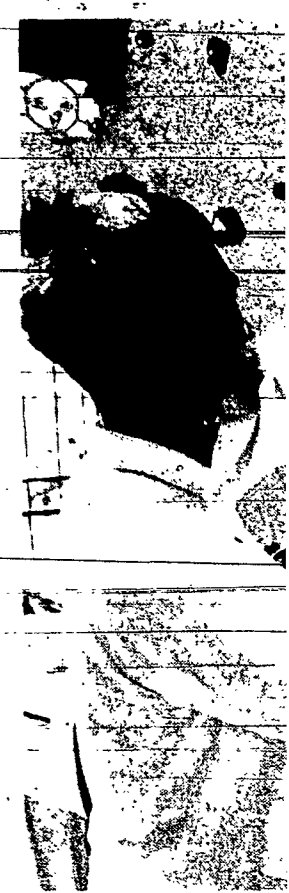
