# Family Life Lectures

## Continue in Auburn

Auburn — Four lectures remain in a six-series session on marriage and family life being offered to seniors of Mt. Carmel High School.

The lectures were scheduled in conjunction with the senior religion classes under the direction of Father David Kearns, O. Carm.

The series began March 4 and 5 when Dr. Ralph Getty, chief of obstetrics and gynecology at Auburn Memorial Hospital, spoke. On March 18, Robert Bransigan, school psychologist for the Auburn Board of Education, was to talk on the psychological demands and responsibilities of married life.

Other lectures scheduled:

April 15 — Mrs. Lola Health, supervising public health nurse from the Cayuga County Health Department, on the importance of pre-natal care.

April 22 — Michael Stapleton, mortgage consultant at Auburn Savings Bank, on financial aspects of marriage.

April 29 — Peter Corning, a graduate of Syracuse University College of Law, on the relevance of law to the average married couple.

May 6 — Two couples from the Pre-Cana staff of the Rochester Diocesan Eastern Vicariate, on experiences and problems in early marriage and how they were overcome.


Programs for grammar school and high school boys and girls, as well as for young adults, will be conducted by the organization.

## Bridges of Confidence in Peru

Jull, Peru — Before you can build bridges of stone, you have to build bridges of confidence. Building of these bridges here is part of the work of Father John M. Donahue, a Maryknoll missionary from 312 E. Miller St., Elmira, N.Y.

Father Donahue is the director of the Institute of Rural Education, which trains "campesinos" — farmers — in leadership, community living and farming methods.

The IRE supports a farm of 112 acres, part of which in turn supports the institute and its \$45,000 annual budget. But

Community thought and movement, the idea of working together with others for the common good, is a way of living which is only now being introduced to the Peruvian campesinos who, historically, are an individual and isolated people.

Needed, said Father Donahue, is a way to make the education alive — vital, and dynamic. "We are improving not only the content of the course, but its motivational factors."

What the IRE hopes to accomplish is "the discovery by the campesino of a new dimension in his life."

The son of a farmer himself, Father Donahue feels at home in the often rugged country of Jull, working with both the people and the land.

"I keep spirits up by keeping up with communications and, with high motivation myself, things progress smoothly."

modern equipment is at a minimum and with good reason, says Father Donahue.

"We're just entering the era of oxen — bulls, really — pulling ploughshares. Up to now the farmers have been using sticks of wood, pushed by hand. With bull-drawn steel ploughs we're jumping ahead 500 years."

While the IRE teaches the campesino to make the most of what's available in farming equipment and then some, its primary function, according to Father Donahue, is the forming of leaders among the campesinos.

"Merely training the people in technical matters and sending them back to their own communities was found ineffectual," said Father Donahue. "For without the confidence and the sense of community which the leadership courses instill, the campesino cannot share his knowledge with friends and neighbors."
