George Beahon, longtime sportswriter and columnist for the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle, has resigned and will take a position with Finger Lakes Race Track, the Courier-Journal learned this week.

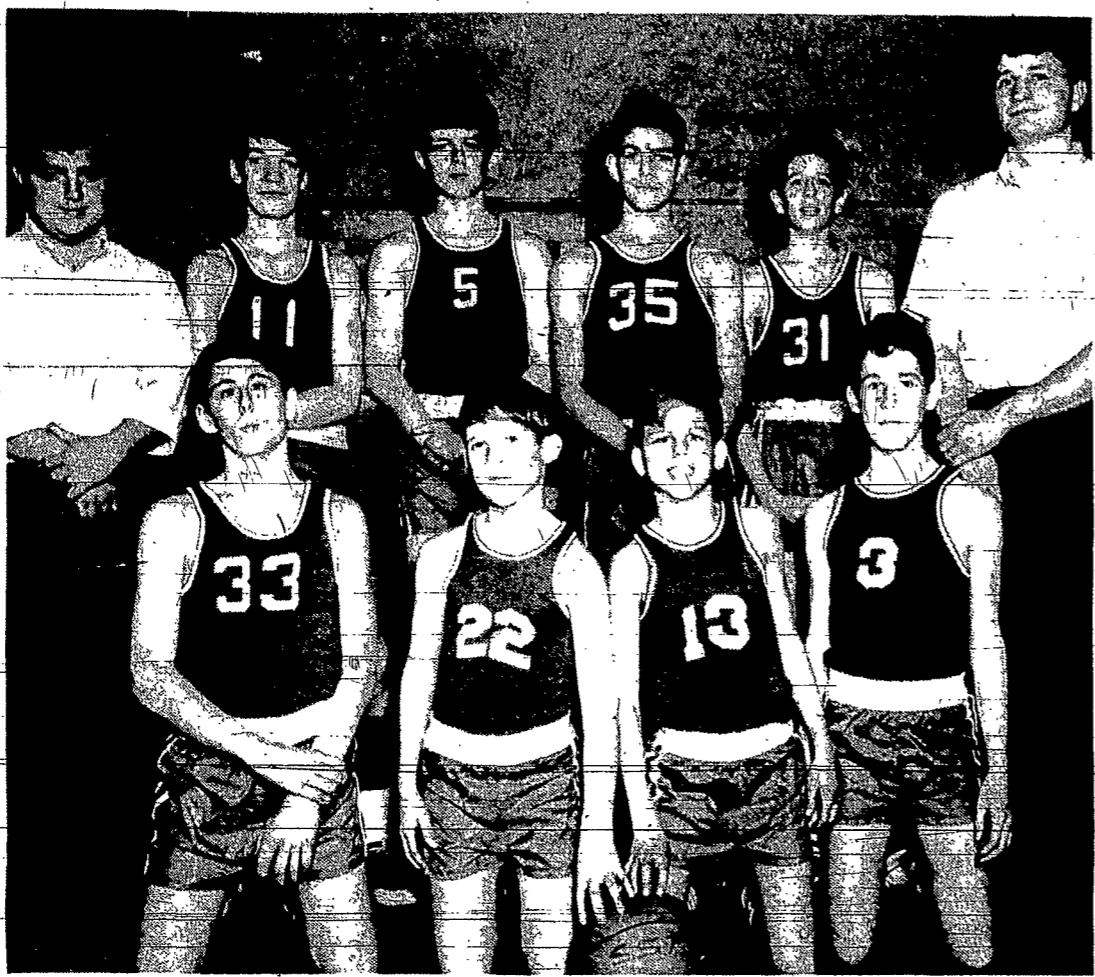
Beahon, who is in Arizona covering baseball training sites for the Gannett News Service, was not available for comment, but it was learned he will join the race track staff in late April.

Beahon has worked at the Democrat and Chronicle for about 27 years.

He attended St. Andrew's Seminary for three years and transferred to Aquinas Institute, from which he was graduated in 1937. He also is a graduate of Niagara University.

He is a member of Guardian Angels Parish in Henrietta and has helped at parish projects including lining up speakers for the annual sports night. Father John B. Kleintjes said Beahon also assisted the school in a 6th grade newspaper project.

Mr. and Mrs. Beahon have three children—a girl in Guardian Angels' 6th grade and two older sons.

Mooney High Plans Basketball Camp

Boys from 10 to 17 years of age will be able to attend a "basketball camp" next summer at Cardinal Mooney High School.

Three two-week sessions are scheduled — each for a different age group. They are slated Mondays through Fridays, from 9 a.m. until noon each day. The schedule:

First session, July 7 to 18 — ages 10-12 years; second session, July 21-Aug. 1 — ages 13-14 years; third session, Aug. 4-15 — ages 15-17 years.

Ed Nietopski, Mooney High School athletic director who will direct the summer camp, said the number of registrations will be limited so that adequate personal attention can be given each boy.

Tuition fee will be \$40 for the two-week session. It will include insurance and a camp uniform. Nietopski noted that a \$10 registration fee must be included with the application and that it is not refundable. It will be applied toward the tuition fee.

Nietopski listed a typical daily session as follows: free shooting period; warm-up and conditioning; individual offensive skills; individual defensive skills; two-man and three-man offensive and defensive fundamentals; movies; squad team scrimmage.
