Father Malachy Honored in Auburn

Auburn — Sunday, Apr. 20, was "Father Malachy Day" at Mount Carmel High School. The people of Auburn bade farewell and expressed their gratitude to the former principal of Mount Carmel, Father Malachy Mahoney, O.C. Father Malachy stepped down from his position at the local Catholic high school due to illness. Father is now reported in good health and has assumed new duties at "Transfiguration Church" in Terrytown, N.Y.

Father Malachy was born in White Plains, N.Y. He attended high school at Saint Albert's Seminary and the Carmelite high school in Middletown, N.Y. He completed his novitiate here in Auburn where he professed his vows on Sept. 8, 1951.

The former Carmel principal holds a B.A. degree from St. Bonaventure University and has completed theological studies at Whitefriars Hall in Washington, D.C. He was ordained at the Carmelite parish of Saint Simon Stock in the Bronx on May 26, 1957. In September 1957 Father was assigned to Mt. Carmel as an instructor of English, social studies and religion.

Father Malachy served at Mt. Carmel for twelve years supervising the operation of the school as the principal for the past five years. While in Auburn, he devoted his efforts to the high school and the community.

At his farewell reception Father Malachy was presented tokens of appreciation from the Mt. Carmel student body and several of the local organizations he was affiliated with.

9 Protestants Back Aid for Parish Schools

Providence—(NC) — Nine Protestant church leaders issued a statement here urging the Protestant community to stop acting as though its only concern was the destruction of the Roman Catholic school system and start acting in trust toward our Roman Catholic brethren.

In a letter to the Rhode Island Assembly, the Protestant churchmen argued that public funds could "become available for the education of all the children within the state" in accordance with the U.S. Constitution. "The funds would provide necessary supplements for non-public school teachers."

In Boston, meanwhile, the Rev. Paul L. Sturges, executive minister of the Massachusetts Baptist Convention, told the state legislature: "We cannot oppose . . . public monies being used for the support of nonpublic or religious schools, provided that the leaders of schools seeking such support are willing to accept the obligation involved in the acceptance."
