## TV Mass the Work of Many

The announcement was made this week by Hart-Conway Advertising Agency and the Basilian Fathers of Aquinas Institute that the first regularly televised Mass will be seen this Sunday at 8 a.m. on Channel 10, WHEC-TV.

There are any number of people behind the origination of the Mass to be seen each Sunday in color. Among these you can thank by letter, should you wish, are Father Leon G. Hart of Aquinas, Dan Morgan of Hart-Conway who approached the Basilians with the idea and most certainly to Glover Delaney, general manager of WHEC-TV, which is donating the valuable air time.

But, of course, the real credit goes to those who got busy and did something concrete about achieving the Mass. Let's show our thanks by spreading the word to our sick and aged and all others who cannot attend church.

An otherwise good record was marred by the "Prudential's On Stage" most recent presentation which chronicled the last dying gasps of a big city daily newspaper.

"This Town Will Never Be the Same," with Barry Sullivan as the managing editor and E. G. Marshall as the newspaper's penny-pinched publisher was forceful in building audience indifference.

There were the usual clichés: e.g. the managing editor's son possibly mixed up in a drug scandal and the m.e.'s insistence that the story was more important than his son's welfare.

Other clichés included the inevitably reporter working at his desk with his hat on; the weepy switchboard operator who was a real newspaper trower at heart; the sick and elderly, provide holiday food and gifts and generally stand-by-to-help-the-need.

Someday somebody's going to write a story about newspaper people showing them to be every bit as staid and businesslike as your friendly neighborhood executive with the same amount of romance in their hearts and towards their profession as a CPA.

Until then, I for one, plan to abstain from any more city room locales.
