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PAR Criticized for Limited Perspective

The Priests' Association of Rochester (PAR) was criticized, politely but firmly, last week for concentrating too much on priests' problems and not enough on the needs of other people.

Mgr. John Egan, veteran Chicago pastor, told 110 priests gathered for the second annual PAR meeting on April 23, that he was "candidly, a bit discouraged," by the two-hour resolutions debate he had just heard. Most of the resolutions dealt with clerical problems.

"This meeting has not spoken enough to the needs of the modern world," he commented, listing such items as "war and peace, poverty, race, the campus crises and the issue of Catholic education."

Much of the current discussion on the priestly "identity crisis," he continued, may be an "evasion," used to justify inaction on vital issues by priests.

"The Church can't work out the whole synthesis of telling us what we are. We must initiate more, be more creative, give some genuine evidence of life," he continued, adding with a smile, "perhaps the bishops are waiting for us."

Father Patrick O'Malley of Chicago, recently elected for a second term as president of the National Federation of Priests Councils, was the other main speaker at the day long session at the Tremholm East Motel in Canandaigua. He stressed the need for more initiative from priests, stating "we share some of the responsibility for the direction of the Church."

Referring to the large scale suspension of priests in the Washington, D.C. and San Antonio, Texas, dioceses, he said that new "due process" machinery is a prime need in the American Catholic Church.

One resolution passed urged that a "grass roots" clergy-lay voice be given a hearing at the forthcoming October Synod of Bishops in Rome, at the semi-annual meeting of the American bishops and locally, through a "new, representative Pastoral Council" in the Rochester diocese.

Another recommended that the Rochester diocesan corporation make a yearly public financial statement detailing its assets, receipts and expenditures.

Seven priests were elected to a two-year term on the PAR's 11-man coordinating board. They were:
