

McQuaid Overwhelms Elmira Meet

McQuaid's rampaging runners came up with one of their top performances last Friday night at Parker Field, Elmira, where they captured seven of eight races and set a most scoring record in winning the 18th Annual Elmira Relays.

The Knights, paced by a sprint relay team that established a pair of track, meet, and school records, piled up 38 of a possible 40 points, breaking the old mark of 33 set 12 years ago by Williamsport. The only race McQuaid did not take was the mile medley, in which Aquinas clocked an outstanding 3:36.6 on a 30.1 lead-off quarter-

by Neil Duffy and a 1:59.4 anchor half by Mike Maginn. In that race, McQuaid was second, as Bob Lawrence's 1:58.4 anchor wasn't enough to catch the flying Irish.

McQuaid's foursome of Ned Roland, Mark Weider, Mike Pignato, and Mark Welt, running in that sequence for the first time, clicked with some fine stick-passing in the 440 relay and produced a record time of 43.4, with Welt blazing a 10.1 anchor leg. They came back in the 880 relay and racked up a 1:30.9 as Roland led off with a 22.8 leg and Welt anchored with a 22.0.

Two other runaway wins were scored by the four-mile and two-mile teams. Ed Robertson, Dick Sheridan, Tom McLaughlin and Pete Clark handled the mile legs, with Robertson and Clark both under 4:45. Dean Stanley started the two-mile team off with a 2:01.3. Bill Lenyk followed with a 2:06, and Kevin Boyle and Bob Wafer cruised in from there.

McQuaid's other three wins came in close races. Best of the night was the distance medley, in which Phil Horton took the stick from his anchor mile some 75 yards off the pace and still

came home first with a 4:35.6 effort.

In the 480-yard shuttle hurdles race, Rick Stone gave the Knights a lead with a 1.41 leg, Mike Roberts and John Sentiff chipped in with 14.5 each, and Bill Quinlisk held off two opponents in a 1:47 anchor. The mile relay saw a McQuaid combination of Ralph Celentani, Alan Schreck, Jim Holihan, and Mike Hasenauer team up for a 3:39.3 victory with Holihan taking the lead on the third leg, and Hasenauer hanging on with a 54.3 anchor, his best of the year.

Largest Field Ever For Aquinas Relays

The largest field ever — 26 teams and nearly 900 individual entries — will compete tomorrow, May 24, in the sixth annual Aquinas Relays at the University of Rochester's Favre Stadium. The entrance parade led by the Aquinas Color Guard and the opening exercises will begin at 1 p.m.

The relays annually attract the outstanding track talent of Western New York. Sponsored by the Aquinas alumni and under the direction of Father Cyril F. Carter, C.S.B., Aquinas athletic director, the relays are the largest track event of its kind in upstate New York.

Highlight of the day will be the freshmen events. Operating on the theory that plenty of potential gold medal winners are to be found in the ranks of the freshmen, the frosh events will provide coaches and fans with a preview of future track stars.

According to Alex Thomas, chairman of the relay committee, a total of 178 trophies valued at over \$1200 will be awarded to winning schools and to the individual runners.

Chief judge and official starter is Tony Powderly. Frank (Hunk) Vadas is grand marshal. Bishop James E. Kearney will present the trophies.

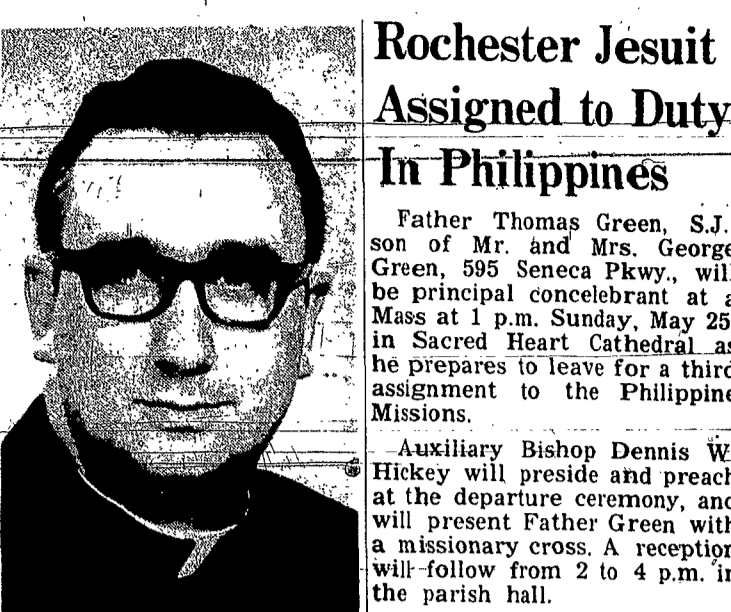
