Mooney Nips Kearney, 2-1

Bishop Kearney's baseball team rallied to tie Cardinal Mooney in the last inning but then lost in the eighth, 2-1, to be virtually eliminated from the first place race.

In other action during the week, Kearney defeated East 8-0 and Wheatland-Chili 8-2. The Kings are 15-4 overall; 9-2 in City-Catholic League competition, and 2-2 in Catholic contests.

On Tuesday, Kearney's Den

Fitzpatrick faced Mooney's Doug Farrell in a mound duel. Farrell, batting in the cleanup position, tripled in the first inning to give Mooney a 1-0 lead.

Fitzgerald then settled down, scattering six hits in seven innings while striking out 13. Meanwhile, Farrell was pitching hitless ball and striking out eight through six innings.

In the seventh, lead-off batter John Tettinger drew a walk and stole second. Jim Zimmerman connected with a drive in-to-right-center-for-a-double. Farrell had lost a shutout and no-hitter with one pitch. A bunt by Mike Knope failed to advance Zimmerman, and a ground out and pop fly later put Farrell out of further trouble.

The Cardinals' John Waffle led off the eighth with a single, Farrell struck out, but then Pete Castle tripled to win the game for Mooney as Kearney failed to score in the bottom of the inning. Cardinal Mooney is undefeated in league play.

Mooney ran its record to 17-1 with a 3-1 victory over Batavia later in the week. Doug Farrell and Mike LaCrosse struck out 16 Batavians en route to a 3-hit victory.

Powerhouse McQuaid Takes Relays Crown

Track power McQuaid romped to an easy victory to capture the Aquinas Relays championship last week at Fauver Stadium. The Knights' 44 points was the highest ever amassed in the meet.

Bishop Kearney and St. Joseph's tied for runnerup honors at 17 points; Aquinas

had 16, Monroe 14, Bishop Timon of Buffalo 12 and Franklin 7.

McQuaid set a meet record in the spring medley relay with a time of 3:38. Al Breckamp, West Roland, Mark Welt and Bob Lawrence combined for the new mark.

The Knights, who scored points in each of the seven events, also won the 440-yard relay, 480 shuttle and distance medley events.

In another record-setting performance, Bishop Kearney's mile relay team posted a 3:30.4. John McKenna, Keith Roeder, Daryl Youngman and George Keegan make up the team.

Patrick Samway To Be Ordained

Father Patrick H. Samway, S.J., son of Mrs. Mary Samway, and the late Henry Samway, 111 Leonard Road, Rochester will celebrate his first Solemn Mass at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 15, in Our Mother of Sorrows Church.

Father Samway will be ordained Thursday, June 12, at Fordham University Chapel by Terence Cardinal Cooke, Archbishop of New York.

He received his early education in Schenectady before entering the Jesuit Novitiate at Belarmine College, Plattsburg, in 1957. In 1961 he began philosophical studies at Loyola Seminary, Shrub Oak, N.Y.

From 1964 to 1966 he taught English at McQuaid Jesuit High School in Rochester, and then pursued theological studies at Woodstock College, Maryland. Next year Father Samway will continue studies at the University of North Carolina.

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Mary Hannick Wins Ira Sapozink Award

Mary Hannick, director of the Genesee Settlement House for the past 22 years has been named winner of the 1969 Ira Sapozink Memorial Award, for having "made the greatest contribution to the community particularly in the interest of youth" in Monroe County.

The award, a \$500 check and a plaque is given annually by newspaper, executives and community and religious leaders in memory of a Times-Union promotion manager who died six years ago.

The letter nominating Miss Hannick described her as having "a vivid imagination, a dynamic personality and a real sincere sensitivity to people."

Miss Hannick, who lives on Edgemere Drive in Greece, studied behavioral sciences at Nazareth and the U of R and

of began her career in social work during the depression.

Miss Hannick served with the Red Cross in France and Germany during World War II and returned to take the directorship of Genesee Settlement House in June 1947.

Describing the work of the House, she said "We help people here sort out things for themselves." The house serves preschool children and transient families as well as helping combat housing deterioration in the neighborhood.

Miss Hannick says that the problems today are no greater than the ones she worked on 20 years ago.
