

3 Nursing Schools To Graduate 110

Three schools of nursing in Catholic hospitals in the Diocese of Rochester are graduating a total of 110 students in commencement exercises this month.

St. Mary's School of Nursing, at St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, graduated 28 on June 8, at 3 p.m. in the Xerox Square Auditorium. Bishop John E. McCafferty was the presiding prelate.

Very Rev. Gerald J. Whelan CSSR, rector of Notre Dame Retreat House, delivered the commencement address; and Sharon N. Foley gave the senior address.

A reception was held in the Bishop Kearney Education Building, in the hospital complex, following the graduation exercises.

Commencement exercises for the 23 graduates of St. Joseph's Hospital Schools of

Nursing and X-Ray Technology, Elmira, were held in St. Peter and Paul's Church at 2:30 p.m., June 8. Auxiliary Bishop John E. McCafferty presented the diplomas and school pins and delivered the commencement address.

Following the ceremonies, a reception was held in the Dunn Memorial Nurses Residence.

From St. James Hospital School of Nursing, 16 are to be graduated June 15, at 3:30 p.m. in St. Ann's Church, Hornell.

Missioner Home on Vacation

Father Edward Gordon is home on vacation for a month of Elmtan spring instead of Bolivian autumn.

Father Golden is one of three diocesan priests serving in the Rochester sponsored Latin American Missions. His assignment is to 30,000 poor of St. Joseph the Worker Parish, La Paz, Bolivia.

"It's going good," he says of the mission work. "We're trying to develop leadership and unity among the people in the zone, get them to help themselves."

"Out of the 30,000 people," he explained, "there are about 14 neighborhood groups. Now we're trying to get them together and to teach them community organization and to develop leaders. And that's pretty hard to do."

Working on the project with Father Golden are Fathers Peter Deckman and Paul Freemesser, also from the diocese, and four Bolivian seminarians.

The recent events surrounding the assassination of Sen. Robert Kennedy in New Orleans, La., which had little effect on the parish, Father Golden said. "We live about 45 minutes

looks good and feels good as long as he stays in bed."

"Father Deckman looks good. He's his usual self, moving all the time. He is in good health and is very involved in work with the leadership program," he said.

Father Golden expects to remain in the diocese until the end-of-the-month, when he will return to La Paz.

Farewell Party Scheduled For Auburn School Faculty

Auburn — Parishioners of St. Francis of Assisi Church have scheduled a farewell party for the faculty of the school at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, June 14, in the school hall.

Unable to obtain teaching Sisters for next September, Father John J. Nacca, pastor, announced three weeks ago that the parish school will close with this year's graduation ceremony. The school had five teaching Sisters and six lay teachers.

The Sisters, members of the Religious of Jesus and Mary, will be leaving the area to teach in other dioceses served by the order. They informed Father Nacca of this decision last fall, and the pastor has been unable to obtain other teaching Sisters.

St. Francis School has been partially staffed by the order since its opening in 1951. Current pupil enrollment numbers 325.

Last week it was announced that 70 of the school's pupils will enroll in other Catholic

schools in the area; 17 will enroll in public schools and 55 were undecided.

The school building, which has 12 classrooms, a library and a combination auditorium-cafeteria, will be used beginning in September for Confraternity of Christian Doctrine classes.

Bircher Priest Criticizes Press

Dayton, Ohio — (NC) — A priest who is a leader in the right-wing John Birch Society charged at a press conference here that "conservative opinion" is not represented in "90 per cent or more" of the Catholic newspapers in this country.

Father Francis E. Fenton, a priest of the Diocese of Bridgeport, said the diocesan press generally has either "ignored or smeared" the Society. The priest is associate editor of the weekly Review of the News, a John Birch publication.

"The Catholic press simply doesn't give us a fair shake," he continued.

Catholic Schools Use Planetarium
