

Bishop: Be Faithful to Christ

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen last Sunday drew parallels between the love of husband for wife and the love of Christ, "the bridegroom" for His Church.

In his sermon at 5 p.m. Thanksgiving Mass for 200 anniversary couples in Sacred Heart Cathedral, the Bishop asked prayers for continuing Cath-

olic loyalty to the faith and to the Church.

The Mass, sponsored by the diocesan Family Life Bureau, was offered especially for couples who have celebrated or will celebrate their 50th or 25th wedding anniversary this year.

Following the Mass, each couple re-

ceived from the Bishop a color photo remembrance of the occasion.

Congratulating the couples on their fidelity to the marriage promises, and on their remaining "loyal sons and daughters of the Church," the Bishop pleaded for their prayers particularly for clergy who do not remain faithful to their priestly vows.

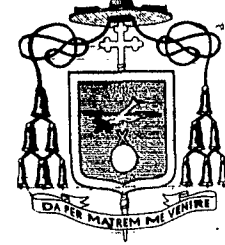

180 Attend 2-Day CCD Workshop

More than 180 Fraternity of Christian Doctrine teachers, representing 45 parishes from the Diocese of Rochester, the Diocese of Syracuse and the Archdiocese of New York, attended the two-day "Come to the Father Teach-In" June 28-29 at Becket Hall, on the St. John Fisher College Campus.

The "teach-in" was sponsored jointly by the diocesan office for the CCD and the Paulist Press, to acquaint CCD teachers with materials available from Paulist Press and to demonstrate the most effective way of using them in the classroom.

Father Kevin Lynch, CSP., Paulist editor-in-chief, and Sister Joan Overholt of the Sisters of Loreto, author of Gospel Initiations, were principal speakers.

The "teach-in" marked the first time that Becket Hall, the diocesan college seminary, was used for an extensive lay gathering.

Rita DeVoldre, of the diocesan CCD office, said, "We are most grateful to Fathers Louis Hohman and Lawrence Murphy and to the seminarians for their help, kindness, generosity and hospitality for the use of Becket Hall. Without their Christian interest, this 'teach-in' could not have been the great success it was."

Signup Set for Parent-Child Sessions

Registrations are now being accepted for a parent-child summer session program slated two mornings during each of four weeks beginning July 8 at the Baptist Temple Church, 1101 Clover St., Brighton.

The classes will be held from 9:30 to 11 a.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays through July 31. Sponsoring the program is the diocesan Office of Christian Formation.

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Eye-Bank to Store All Body Organs

The Rochester Eye-Bank and Research Society, Inc., is expanding its services to include all body parts.

John N. Dimlich, the president, announced today that the society has changed its name to the Rochester Eye and Human Parts Bank, Inc. He said the Human Parts Bank will offer the following services:

- Soliciting donations of eyes, tissues, organs and human parts by pledges to be redeemed after death and to be used for

transplantation, therapy, research or medical education;

- Maintaining a central registry of such pledges;
- Acting as a "middle man" between donor's next-of-kin and a transplant team to complete the gift upon death of the donor;
- Serving as a medical transplant information center through distribution of standard donation forms, literature and other pertinent data.

Dimlich said the Human Parts Bank, believed to be one of the first in the nation, will continue to function as an eye-bank. This service includes the collection, preservation and distribution of eyes and eye tissue, as well as research into blinding disease.

The Human Parts Bank's first assignment is to obtain the donation of kidneys, Dimlich said, currently needed by the University of Rochester Medical Center's kidney teams headed by Drs. Richard B. Freeman and Allyn G. May.

Initial pledges to the Human Parts Bank were signed by Dimlich; Leo W. Waldert, immediate past president of the society; Rosario J. Guglielmino, president emeritus; Frederick J. Mix, honorary board chairman; Edward T. Boyce, executive director, and Mrs. Mildred Pellens, administrative secretary.
