Bishop Kearney will celebrate the Mass and preach at 8 a.m. in St. Joseph's Church. Bishop Sheen will address society members at 9:30 a.m. at the Flagship Hotel.

More than 20 charter members will be presented and honored at the breakfast.

Nearly 500 men are expected to attend the Mass and breakfast, and Donald Karal, chairman, said tickets will be available at adoration hours in six parishes during the next fortnight.

Hourly vigils of prayers and meditation are held once monthly, usually on the last Saturday-Sunday of the month, at Sacred Heart Cathedral, St. Andrew's Church, Blessed Sacrament and St. Helen's. More limited schedules are conducted at Our Lady of Good Counsel and at St. Jerome's, East Rochester.

Fr. Collins Elected to National Post

Father James P. Collins, chaplain at Elmira Reformatory since 1959, this week was elected president of the American Catholic Correctional Chaplains Association.


Father Collins was chosen at the American Correctional Association's convention in Minneapolis. He also was elected president-designate of the American Correctional Chaplains Association, a three-faith group.

A native of Rochester, Father Collins attended Immaculate Conception School and St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, being ordained in 1945. He served as assistant at St. Monica's Church in 1945-49, Holy Family, Auburn, in 1949-57, and St. John the Evangelist's, Rochester. in 1957-59 before being assigned to the Elmira correctional institution.

Father Collins holds a certificate from the Rutgers University Summer School of Alcoholic Studies, and has been an instructor in the field of alcoholism at the Moran Institute of St. Lawrence University.

He helped establish Alcoholics Anonymous groups at Elmira Reformatory, and a contact system for inmates on their release. He presently is completing a third term as president of the State Department of Correction Chaplains Association, and is an advisor for the Beacon Group of AA parolees organized five years ago in Rochester by the State Division of Parole.

He is a brother of Father Vincent P. Collins, pastor of St. John of Rochester Church, Perinton, who also has been active in the field of alcoholic rehabilitation.

They Serve Missions At Both Ends of World

Three members of the Willig family, long associated with Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Rochester, are what might be termed "distant" cousins.

Two cousin graduates of OLPH School who entered religious orders nearly 40 years ago will be engaged in similar endeavors next month: missionary work.

But they'll be an ocean apart one in Seoul, South Korea, the other in Selma, Ala.

They are Sister Anna Marie Willig, RGS, now in Korea, and Sister Catherine Teresa Willig, SSJ., a Sister of St. Joseph who has been serving in Elmira and who will begin labors in Selma in September.

Another cousin whom the Sisters visited some time ago is Miss Marie Willig, 83, 12 Borchard St., Rocheser, a parishioner of OLPH Church.

Sister Anna Marie has been in forcign missions since a year after she cntered the Good Shepherd Order in Peekskill in 1930.

Sister Catherine Teresa has been serving at St. Joseph's Hospital Schoolof Nursing for several years, teaching religion to nursing students. She recently volunteered for service at the Sisters' hospital in Alabama.

Sister Anna Marie began her missionary work in 1932 in Shanghai, where she helped establish the first Good · Shepherd / Home for Girls in China. During the latter years of World War II their work was halted,
