Religious Education Week

Mayor Frank T. Lamb of Rochester has designated by proclamation Religious Education week (Sept. 22-28) in Rochester.

The proclamation is one of several events marking the commemorative occasion and affirms the contribution of religion to the moral and spiritual life of the city and education as a vital element of religion.

The week of special events promoting the idea of religious education is sponsored by the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Diocese of Rochester and

the Christian Education Department, Rochester Area Council of Churches.

An exhibit of art in Midtown Plaza and a youth rally at 5:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 28, at Central Presbyterian Church will climax the week. The Brass Buttons, D. Harvey Potter and Bat McGrath, a singing duo and the Troubadors Choir will be featured in a two-hour musical special which is expected to draw nearly 1,500 young people.

Father Daniel Holland of the CCD Office described the week as an attempt "to alert our community to its own religious

needs and to the many opportunities to fulfill it."

"Adults need a new look at their faith. Youth needs opportunities to search for answers with adults who are involved in the same process. Young children need the experience of God's love," Father Holland said.

He also stated that "With the Rochester Area Council of Churches, the Diocesan CCD Office hopes to alert the people of Monroe County to the many services and programs happening in our midst."



Nearly 50 religion teachers from parishes in Cayuga County attended workshop Sept. 20-21 in St. Alphonsus School. Sponsored by Cayuga County Office for Christian Formation, it outlined use of "Come to the Father" religion series being used for first time in grades one, two and three. Father Bernard Carges, director of religious education for elementary grades in Eastern Vicariate, supervised the workshop.

Interfaith Chapel Lists Open House

Geneseo—Open house inspection of the newly-opened Interfaith Center adjoining State University College here is scheduled from 3 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 5.

Father Thomas R. Statt, chaplain of the Newman Apostolate here, said all Newman activities, including two Sunday Masses and a daily afternoon Mass, will be held in the center, which includes an auditorium for worship seating 400.

For years Catholic faculty and students have attended Masses and other devotions in St. Mary's Church.

The new center, not officially affiliated with the university, will be used for religious services and educational programs of Catholic, Jewish, Protestant and other denominations. Funds for its construction were contributed by the Catholic and Episcopal Dioceses of Rochester, students and their families, faculty, alumni, and individuals in the area.

CYO Drive Report Due on Tuesday

More than 200 volunteers in the current Catholic Youth Organization membership campaign will make final reports to captains at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 30, in the Columbus Civic Center ballroom.

Captains in turn will report to section leaders at 8 p.m. the following night, Oct. 1.

Thirty-eight per cent of the goal of 5,000 new memberships had been reached at the first report Sept. 22. Division A, under the leadership of K. Albert Bennett, took a two-to-one lead over Division B, chairmaned by Dr. Peter Pelittieri.

Members of Knights of Columbus Councils in Rochester,

East Rochester, Webster and Henrietta comprise most of the volunteers, under the general chairmanship of F. Robert Ridley, grand knight of Rochester Council 173.

During the last year, Ridley noted, the CYO reached more than 12,000 boys and girls in its activities. Sponsoring memberships were granted to 3,120 disadvantaged youngsters; 958 youths learned how to swim; 285 Boy Scouts received swimming and lifesaving badges; nearly 1,500 boys participated in parish basketball; 2,073 girls competed in cheerleading, and nearly 3,000 boys and girls from 13 parochial schools received weekly physical training education.
