

### FRED FOWLER'S COLLEGE FOOTBALL RATINGS

Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings measure the comparative strength of major college football teams for a particular season. Similar to baseball averages, they differ in that they are not confined to a single department such as batting. Teams actually rate themselves on their game performances. Factors considered are offense, defense and caliber of opposition. Although the ratings provide a measurement of the average strength of opponents, they DO NOT forecast game results. Normally, a team with a rating 10 points higher than its opponent may be considered the favorite. However, the ratings make no allowances for home field, morale factors, injuries, lineup changes, weather conditions, etc. Fowler started his rating system in 1948 and originally used it for basketball. It was successful from the start, but some refinements have been added during the past 20 years. Today it is one of the more accurate methods of comparing the relative strength of college football teams.

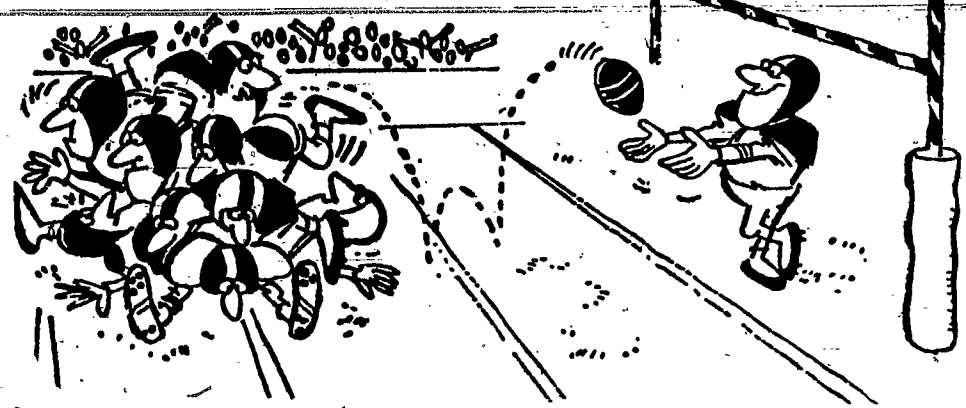

### Aquinas 11 Impresses All But Its Coach

Just how good the Aquinas Little Irish are going to be in 1969, a cause of some concern in the past few weeks, has been answered to the satisfaction of everybody but Coach Bob Rosmarino.

Stubbornly pessimistic even after last Friday's convincing 35-20 victory over Mont Pleasant of Schenectady, Rosmarino finds weaknesses in his big, fast club that could bring disaster in this Sunday's encounter with McQuaid. Last year the Knights stunted the Irish, 19-0.

The coach finds few to share his doubts in the flush of last weekend's win over the stout Raiders. Nearly 7,000 watched the game in ideal football weather under the new lights of Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

One authority who disagrees with Rosmarino is Tony Tarisi, Mt. Pleasant's coach, who saw his charges drop their third straight decision to Aquinas. Tarisi, who played football with Rosmarino at Holy Cross College, made a flat comment: "It's the best team I've seen up here."

It could be, Tarisi was frank.

ly confident this year. His team was all veteran and obviously more polished than the club that bowed by a 27-6 score a year ago. But the Irish speed, both in the line and in the backfield, smothered the visitor's attack.

The running of Rich Russo and Mike Palumbo was as good as any Aquinas halfbacks have offered in recent years. The fleet Russo lived up to his notices as he made yardage with half the Mt. Pleasant team swarming over him. He accounted for three touchdowns. Palumbo was dangerous while he was in there, scoring a pair of TD's, one 46 yards and the other 35 yards while a third was called back because of a penalty.

### Kings Bow to Proctor

Less than a minute after the opening whistle of Bishop Kearney's Saturday start, a gridiron nightmare had occurred. The Proctor Panthers' speedy halfback, Al Rocci, had dodged and darted his way 85 yards through the King kickoff squad to give his team a 6-0 lead.

Capitalizing on the element of surprise, quarterback Joe Arcuri then threw to the right side and hit Phil Taurisano for the two-point conversion.

Statistically, the Kings outplayed the Panthers, but they lost, 8-6, tonight, Sept. 26, at 7:30. Kearney hosts Rome Free Academy at Aquinas stadium.

In the closing minutes of the first quarter, Kearney took over on a fumble on the King's 45-yard line. Quarterback Tom Lapple fired to end Jerry Horak to move the ball to Proctor's 48. Lapple carried to the

45 for a first down, and after an incomplete pass, flipped a screen pass to Tom Snyder, who ran it to the 33. Lapple sneaked to the 28, and on the next play, pitched out to Jim Leone, who bulled his way to the 23-yard line as the quarter ended.

On a third down play, Snyder was stopped by the Panthers' strong line at the 23, a shade short of a first down. It was time for the sneak, and co-captain Lapple moved to the 20. Lapple passed to Tim Williams at the 10. Joe Kuby ran to the 8, but the play was called back on an off-side call. Dramatically, the screen was called on the next play, and Tom Snyder scampered into the end zone. Proctor held on a two-point attempt by Snyder.

In the second half, Kearney's defensive line always managed to contain Proctor's first down tries, but the offense just couldn't get on the scoreboard again.
