burden; 12% of motorists drive through red lights, therefore, traffic laws are a symbol of police abnormality.

. Do increases in law breaking, however, necessarily prove that the law is wrong? The F.B.I. reports that in the United States pick-pocketing has increased 87%, purse snatching-223%, bicycle stealing—83%, auto the ft—140%, burglaries — 250%, bank robberies — 302%, rape — 84%, murder — 52%. In other words, while population increased 11%, crimes increased 122%. Why not. by the same logic, apply the anomic mentality to honesty, decency and fidelity, and grant moral holidays and freedom from prosecution to those who find it hard not to steal, rape and pillage?

In other areas, the anomic creates a love of novelty, "itching ears" and "wandering off after man's fictions" (2 Tim. 4/3). It runs after liturgical innovations which shock, sermons which thumb noses at the creed and behavior which is almost neurotic in its desire to prove "identity" by shoving aside decorum and courtesy. The anomic man has no deep spiritual roots, and always looks for validation from without. It is not the Church which gives him authenticity, but "the charism" of the world. He must be recognized in the eyes of others, especially the un-Churched, or the anti-Church. His personality is constructed by either the approving eyes, or the disapproving frowns of his clique; like an elephant in a herd, he dreads isolation from it, and scrupulously avoids all those who would stand for nomos and order.

This anomic spirit of the world with its romantic exaltation of the ego, is bound to infect conformists who seek identification with worldliness. In this carbon monoxide of anomism, celibacy cannot live; it can hardly be discussed. It stands for constraint, and in the aggressive, egotistic atmosphere of "I am who am", what other response

is possible except, "Non serviam"? "I will not

The four reasons for the unpopularity of celibacy are rarely faced. Some would become conformists to the mood of the times, and recommend abandonment of celibacy; others, reacting against such conformists, would merely rehash all that has been said about celibacy, and not place it in the context of our times where the priestly life is lived with difficulty.

The above attitudes mislead many. They should be, however, a reminder that life may be a bed of roses, but it has pillows of thorns. Vietnam, caner, high taxes, ersatz mysticism through pharmaceuticals, the threat of nuclear incineration, the decline of prayer, the irreverence to the holy and marriages exploding into divorce are other facts of our times.

Now anyone who would come along and say that the abandonment of celibacy will open the gates of paradise to the frustrated clergy, is a fool. How naive can one be?

But on the other hand, celibacy must be rethought, not forgetting either the decline of faith, nor the never-changing demands of Him Who bade us "count the cost". In the face of the latter, we ask Christ if He demands such sacrifice:

> "Must Thy harvest-fields Be dunged with rotten death?"






