

Appeal Made For Aid to World's Poor

Father Joseph Reinhart assumed the post of diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith last Sunday with an ardent appeal to "relatively affluent America, despite its poverty problems," to continue its financial assistance to millions of deprived people in other parts of the world.

Back from a 38-day journey visiting missions in three continents, he maintained that Americans could not begin to imagine the degradation of people in other nations, particularly in Asia and Africa, unless they were there to experience it.

Father Reinhart delivered the homily at a Mission Sunday Mass celebrated in Sacred Heart Cathedral by Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen. Concelebrants, besides Father Reinhart, were Msgr. John F. Duffy, newly-appointed pastor of St. Mary's Church, Dansville, and Father John Rossi, chaplain of St. Mary's Hospital, who accompanied Father Reinhart on the world trip.

Father Reinhart said he and Father Rossi had taken many pictures of missions in the 11 countries they visited, and that they would be prepared to exhibit them for any organizations that might make a request.

Msgr. Duffy had headed the Propagation office for eight years before being named to the Dansville pastorate.

Immaculate Conception To Offer 'Sanctuary'

Immaculate Conception parish in Rochester will "open our church and its facilities in 'symbolic sanctuary' for those who cannot morally serve in the Vietnam War," it was announced at Masses last Sunday.

The declaration was part of a resolution passed at a Parish Council meeting Oct. 13. It was adopted by a 10 to 3 vote, with five council members absent. The parish was the first in the diocese to take such a stand.

In a press release of the resolution, which also was inserted in the Sunday bulletin, the action was explained as follows:

"Symbolic sanctuary, which the Council recognizes as having no legal or canonical significance, is understood as providing a place to stay for someone who for religious or moral reasons refuses to be inducted into military service.

"It does not protect a person against apprehension or enforcement of the sanctions connected with the Selective Service Law, nor does it include actions which would interfere with arrest. It is exactly what it says, 'symbolic sanctuary,' and is intended to dramatize the religious and moral significance of the individual's right to refuse participation in a war which he conscientiously believes to be immoral."

Declaring that "we no longer support or condone this war," the resolution stated that "we

seriously question any further expeditions launched by this nation against the non-whites of the world as tinged with racist colonialism."

Termining the Vietnam War "primarily as an example of racism on an international scale," the announcement noted that the main implication of the resolution was "to commit the parish to become more conscious of institutionalized racism in all its forms, and to work actively to eliminate it."

The resolution, submitted to the Council and the parish in September by Council member James A. Chisholm, contended that "the anguish and suffering caused to the people of this nation and to the people of Vietnam has exceeded all measure of good that could be gained from this war."

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J. Cullinane Honored for CYO Work

Ecumenical Day Held at Geneseo

Guest speaker was Dr. Roger Shinn of the faculty of Union Theological Seminary, New York City. He spoke on "The Ethics of Doing Your Own Thing."

Dealing first with "What Happens When Private Morality Goes Political," and then with "New Freedoms and

the New Attack on Tolerance." A movie, "The New Morality," pointed up the need of college students to discuss both of the speaker's topics.

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
