Fall Reading

The Old Testament and Theology, by G. Ernest Wright (Harper and Row; \$6.00). Wright takes on the "younger" radical theologians in order to rescue the independence of God from their Jesusology. What is basically Biblical, Dr. Wright asserts, is a political understanding of the universe—a factor that fascinates both the established and the disenchanted in church, synagogue and university.

Grace in Freedom, by Karl Rahner (Herder and Herder; \$5.95). The core sections are on responsibility and freedom—Rahner's real home territory—and give in a readable style the summation of his thought.

In Praise of Play, by Robert E. Neale (Harper and Row; \$5.95). Praised as a work of profound meaning and high originality, this book is said to rehabilitate the religious vision by linking it with laughter, delight, enchantment and play.

Wisdom's Child, by Joseph Simmons and Jeanne Reidy (Herder and Herder; \$3.95). The perspective authors of The Risk of Loving present a second venture into the realm of something which might be called "indirect counseling."

Discoverers of Space, by Erich Lessing et al (Herder and Herder; \$19.50). A pictorial narrative with over 200 illustrations (75 of them in full color). Introduced by Archibald MacLeish, with contributions by Sir Bernard Lovell, Werner von Braun and others.

The Psalms: their origin and meaning, by Leopold Sabourin S.J. (Alba House; \$17.50, 2 vol. set). In this book the author has digested and summarized the results of an immense amount of labor devoted to the text of the psalms in modern times, mostly by Protestant and Catholic scholars.

The Gospel where it Hits Us, by Rosemary Haughton (Ave Maria Press; \$1.35, paper). Intriguing in depth discussion of sex, marriage, virginity, the nature of woman, conscience, freedom, authority... what it really means to be a Christian.

Time and Timelessness, by H. J. Marrou (Sheed and Ward; \$5.00). A celebrated historian explores the question of how the Christian faith can be lived in a time of crisis and revolution. Arnold Toynbee said of the book, "Very moving... I have found myself agreeing wholeheartedly with his conception of Man's situation."

A New Catholic Commentary on Holy Scripture, general editor R. C. Fuller (Nelson; \$27.50). The original 1952 edition of this work, while addressed primarily to Catholic students, was welcomed by all Christians and accepted immediately as a major contribution to better understanding of the Bible. Scholarship in the ensuing years, however, made a revision imperative.

Augustinianism and Modern Theology, by Henri de Lubac, S.J. (Herder and Herder; \$8.50). DeLubac follows the process by which Augustine's theories became distorted in the theologies of Baius and Jansenius.

TV Movie Ratings

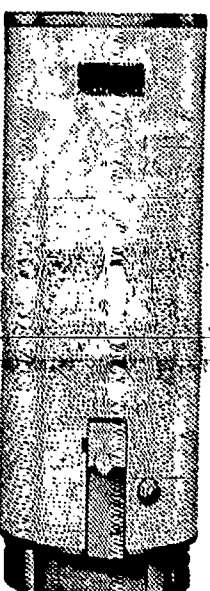
