## Knights Win Veterans Day Cross Country

McQuaid harriers and their Rochester cohorts came back after a poor showing at last Saturday's Inter-Diocesan Championships in Syracuse to take the top four team positions in Tuesday's 9th Annual Veterans Day Meet at Cobbs Hill.

The Knights were first of 8 schools, with 57 points. Following in order were Kearney with 67, Mooney with 108, and Aquinas with 126. McQuaid's Phil Horton took second place in the 95-yard runner, finishing 20 yards behind Arcadia's Phil Mance and 5 yards in front of City champion Mike Koster.

Dick Sheridan of McQuaid and Bill Fox of Aquinas also took trophies, with 5th and 6th place showings. Completing McQuaid's winning squad were Mike Cramer (14), John Hurley (17), and Greg Smith (18).

At Syracuse 3 days earlier, the Knights slugged to a disappointing third in the 4-team race among the diocesan champs, and Rochester's 14-man entry also wound up third behind Syracuse and Buffalo. McQuaid managed only one scorer for the diocesan total, placing Horton 17th among 54 runners. Rochester's other points came from Fox (11), John Terrell and Marty Lawson of Kearney (14 and 16), and Bob Curtis of Mooney (19).

Syracuse diocese and its champion, CBA, won the two-way scoring for the second straight year, while Brian Quinn of St. Joseph's and Mark Cudek of Cardinal Dougherty gave Buffalo a 1-2 in the individual race.

The Church World, weekly newspaper for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Portland, has presented her meditations on the Zodiac symbols. In a former issue it published a series of meditations on the oil company symbols used at gasoline stations.

"Since Christ is the Alpha and Omega," Miss Jones writes, "the Beginning and the End, is it so strange to find Him throughout the years, even in a non-Christian concept?"

Miss Jones calls Aquarius, the Water Bearer, "one of the most direct symbols of Christ in the Zodiac."

## Deaths

### Dr. Racz

A Requiem Mass was celebrated for Dr. Zoltan David Racz Thursday at St. Bernard's Seminary. He died Monday, Nov. 10, 1969, after a long illness.

Dr. Racz was a professor of Jewish history and liturgy and Hebrew grammar at St. Bernard's. He was also reading theology there in preparation for receiving the diaconate.

Born in Hungary of a Jewish family, he became a rabbi and during World War II he was confined in Dachau concentration camp. On his release, he became the chief rabbi of the O-Buda Synagogue in Budapest. He and his family escaped to Canada during the Hungarian revolution.

Two years ago, while visiting Mt. Saviour Monastery in Elmira, Dr. Racz was baptized a Catholic.

Dr. Racz is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, his son, Peter, and one sister and one brother in Budapest, Hungary.

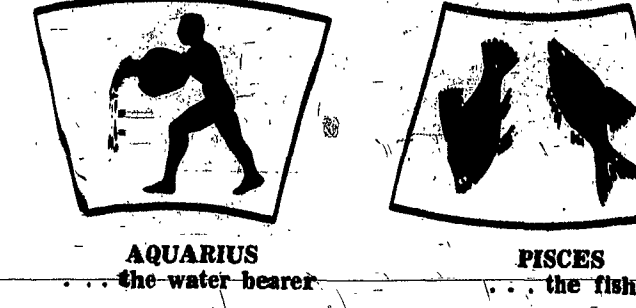

The other Zodiac sign which Miss Jones equates with Christ is Aries the Ram, "as a ram is a grown-up lamb."

The most difficult zodiacal sign to translate into a Christian meaning is Sagittarius the Archer, claims Miss Jones. "The only connection for the average Christian would be through St. Sebastian's martyrdom," she said. "This should encourage Christians to pray for those presently being martyred, such as the Sudanese Christians."

For other signs of the Zodiac Miss Jones gives the following meditations for Christians:

**Taurus the Bull** — Either the winged ox which represents St. Luke, or the bulky St. Thomas Aquinas, who was referred to as the "dumb Sicilian ox."

**Gemini the Twins** — The most famous twin in Christian history, the doubting St. Thomas. "Gemini can remind us that though we live in an Age of Doubt, God's presence is all about us, especially in other Christians."

**Leo the Lion** — The first epistle of St. Peter says: "Be

virgo be watchful! For your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, goes about seeking someone to devour" (Peter 5:8). "Evil today has not changed, as witness drug peddlers and pornographic movie advertisements."

**Virgo the Virgin** — This zodiacal period comes not long after the Feast of the Assumption, recalling the Blessed Mother, an appropriate time to meditate on the sanctity possible to those who do the Will of God.

**Scorpio the Scorpion** — The desert insect with its "extremely painful" sting. "Since Scorpio includes most of November, the month of the Holy Souls, this zodiacal period is definitely appropriate for meditation on the Christian meaning of death."

**Capricorn the Goat** — The description of the last judgment (Matthew 25:31-46) relates that the Son of Man "will set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left..."

**Pisces the Fish** — The fish is the symbol "of the harassed and persecuted early Church when it was not safe to use the crucifixion."

## \$227,000 Aid Voted for Blacks

Indianapolis (RNS)—Grants of \$227,028 from a special fund for assistance to blacks were voted here by the United Methodist Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

Fifteen projects in 10 states, scholarships and a task force to work with the Church's Commission on Religion and Race received allocations.

Basic purpose of the fund is to provide hospital services for poor blacks, homes for children and to train leaders for charitable service in health facilities.

## The Most Unlikely Places

Three hundred miles by helicopter, then 75 miles by motorboat—by a lone priest, on one sick call. Where was this amazing trip? The jungles of Africa? The remotest villages of India? No! This apostolic journey was taken by one of the three missionary priests in Greenland!

"We feel that something is missing when people are simply born into one religion—as when people are Catholics or Moslems or Buddhists just because everyone else is. And so in this country, we want to help people make their religious conviction a matter of personal choice. We want to make it possible for a native Greenlander to become a Catholic, if he so wishes."
