## Father McHugh:

### America Has Failed Biafrans

One of the scandals of current history will be the heedlessness of peoples and governments to the needless deaths of hundreds of thousands of persons, particularly children, by starvation in the Nigeria-Biafra conflict in Africa.

So declared Father Joseph M. McHugh, CSSp., an Irish Holy Ghost missionary who has served in Nigeria since 1960 and who spoke at meetings in Rochester last week at Sacred Heart Cathedral School and St. Plus Tenth School.

Father McHugh, in the United States under the auspices of the Catholic Relief Services to testify to the gravity of the Biafran crisis, was invited to Rochester by the local committee for Emergency Relief for Nigeria/Biafra. During the last year the ERNB committee, which takes no side in the political-civil conflict, has raised more than \$35,000 to send food, medicine and doc-

tors and nurses to the war-torn nation.

Father McHugh contended that the Nigeria-Biafran war could be settled through reasonable negotiation, but that it continues because of the "self-centered political and economic greed" of several of the world's nations. He claimed that the United Nations and the United

States have failed to react "to the moral and humanitarian aspects" of the conflict.

"We all are brothers in Christ," Father McHugh said. "Therefore we all should be greatly concerned that thousands of lives of our fellowmen — no matter where they live — are being sacrificed on an altar of self-interest and greed."

## 'Don't Ignore Past Lessons'

Authors, poets and artists of the past are not necessarily valuable "art" because they aren't in the "now generation."

So declared Dr. Virginia L. Radley, dean of Nazareth College, in talks at the First Unitarian Church, Rochester, at 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 16.

Dr. Radley, Nazareth's first lay dean, developed the point that in today's classrooms study of the "dead" is just as vital as study of the "quick" or "living."

People were just as human in other centuries as they are today, she contended, and many exceptional artists of the past interpreted the human condition as a whole — and not as "a relatively narrow though important instant playback" of what is happening now to segments of society.
