

FRED FOWLER'S COLLEGE FOOTBALL RATINGS

Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings measure the comparative strength of major college football teams for a particular season. Similar to baseball averages, they differ in that they are not confined to a single department such as batting. Teams actually rate themselves on their game performances. Factors considered are offense, defense and caliber of opposition. Although the ratings provide a measurement of the average strength of opponents, they do not forecast game results. Normally, a team with a rating 10 points higher than its opponent may be considered the favorite. However, the ratings make no allowances for home field, morale factors, injuries, illness, lineup changes, weather conditions, etc. Fowler's Rating System is 1948 and originally used it for basketball. It was successful from the start, but some refinements have been added during the past 20 years. Today it is one of the more accurate methods of comparing the relative strength of college football teams.

Ohio State, Texas, Still Pacing College Elevens

Ohio State and Texas held their one-two positions in Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings this week as the Buckeyes trampled Purdue, 42-14, and the Longhorns overwhelmed TCU, 69-7. Mississippi continued as chief spoiler in the Southeast conference with the Rebels devastating previously unbeaten Tennessee, 37-0. This game had the biggest effect on the ratings, dropping the Vols from third to 10th while the Rebs climbed from 20th to 14th.

Aquinas Girds for Basketball

Three members of Aquinas Institute's championship eleven have doffed their gridiron togs and reported for basketball practice. Steve Centron, Pete Schlachter and Mike Craig have joined last year's teammates Larry Mitchell and Tom Rowling as the Irish endeavor to capture the Catholic League basketball crown. Only two seniors, Schlachter and Centron, appear on the Aquinas 13-man roster. John P. Uriah will be making his debut as Aquinas' coach on Friday, Nov. 28, when the Irish entertain Batavia High School. A native of Bridgeville, Pa., Uriah was varsity basketball coach and football line coach at Bishop McCort High School in Jamestown, Pa. His overall basketball record was 83 wins against 18 losses. Last year his team had a 20 and 4 record and won the Diocesan championship. Uriah is a graduate of the University of Dayton. A 14-week basketball schedule for Aquinas varsity and junior varsity teams was released by the school's athletic director, Father Cyril F. Carter, C.S.B. The season's schedule features 20 games including two in the Eastridge Christmas tournament and two in the Diocesan Catholic League playoffs. Aquinas will be looking for its sixth championship in the diocesan tournament. The tourney is traditionally held in mid-March. Regular season play will find the Irish on the road for nine games. All home appearances will be played at the Ritter-Clarke gymnasium on Spring Street.

Woman Renewe

Vaxjo, Sweden — (NC) — 10-year-old struggle over clergy in the Lutheran church has flared up a dispute between a bishop and the rector of his cathedral.

Bishop David Lin Xaxjo in southern Sweden announced that he would name a 25-year-old Miss Inger daughter of a clergyman to the cathedral. This is to be the first of a woman in a diocese, which is regarded as traditionalist and "high diocese." (The "high movement" advocates and church practices resemble those of the Catholic Church.)

The Rev. Gustaf Adrektor of the Vaxjo parish and a leader of the "movement" in the diocese, has said he will not accept the appointment. He has opposed women for a decade and would be able to prevent introduction into the diocese.

A few other dioceses in the Baltic region, including the diocese of Riga, have remained without women. These dioceses are regarded as places of refuge for entering the ministry. The ministry of women ministers number about 20 in the diocese.
