## Club to Award Scholarship

A high school senior in the greater Rochester area will be awarded a four-year scholarship to Villanova University by the Villanova Club of Rochester, it was announced this week.

Herbert C. Lettau, club president, said the scholarship will have an annual maximum value of \$1,000. Candidates must be graduates of an approved secondary school and must satisfy specific requirements related to the degree curriculum selected.

Villanova, located near Philadelphia, is under the direction of the Augustinian Fathers and has a co-ed enrollment of 4,500 undergraduates. It offers courses in liberal arts, science, engineering, commerce, finance and nursing.

## FEWER FRENCH SEMINARIANS

Lyons, France — (RNS) — Alexander Cardinal Renard, Archbishop of Lyons, revealed here that only 475 candidates for the priesthood entered French Catholic seminaries in 1968. This figure is in startling contrast to the 1963 figure of 810 candidates—a loss of 41 per cent.

## Answer to Unrest . . . Communication

Chicago — (RNS) — A Catholic university president asserted here that a major effort to avert campus dissent must be "to achieve understanding," and that if youth is to learn from age, and age is to learn from youth, there must be communication.

Father James F. Maguire, S.J., president of Loyola University, Chicago, told a Loyola Citizens Board audience that "the young are strangers to stability," adding that the youth today have known change and only change and, not fearing it, "leap to embrace it."

Conversely, he noted, age is not at home with change and requires stability. He said that as a result the older generation is wedded to its institutions — structures of past lives.

Father Maguire suggested that the college-age person can't understand why their "hang-ups" on Vietnam, the draft, delayed marriages and their own irrelevant educations take years to solve when man can reach the moon in a decade.

Noting that while youth obviously has much to learn from age, the priest said that "not so obvious, particularly to men and women in their 40s, 50s, and 60s, is the truth that age has much to learn from youth—if age is to be the discriminating protector of our institutions."

Under the auspices of the coffee house, the so-called "free university" is conducted, he said. It provides lectures on a wide variety of subjects, mainly world and national issues, not normally covered in classrooms.

Father Maguire, noting that dissent cannot be completely forestalled on any campus, said that "patient and persistent efforts to reach understanding are essential." He added that while repressive measures may prove necessary at times, they do not get to the deep roots of the problems and may alienate further students who would not otherwise give vent to their frustrations.

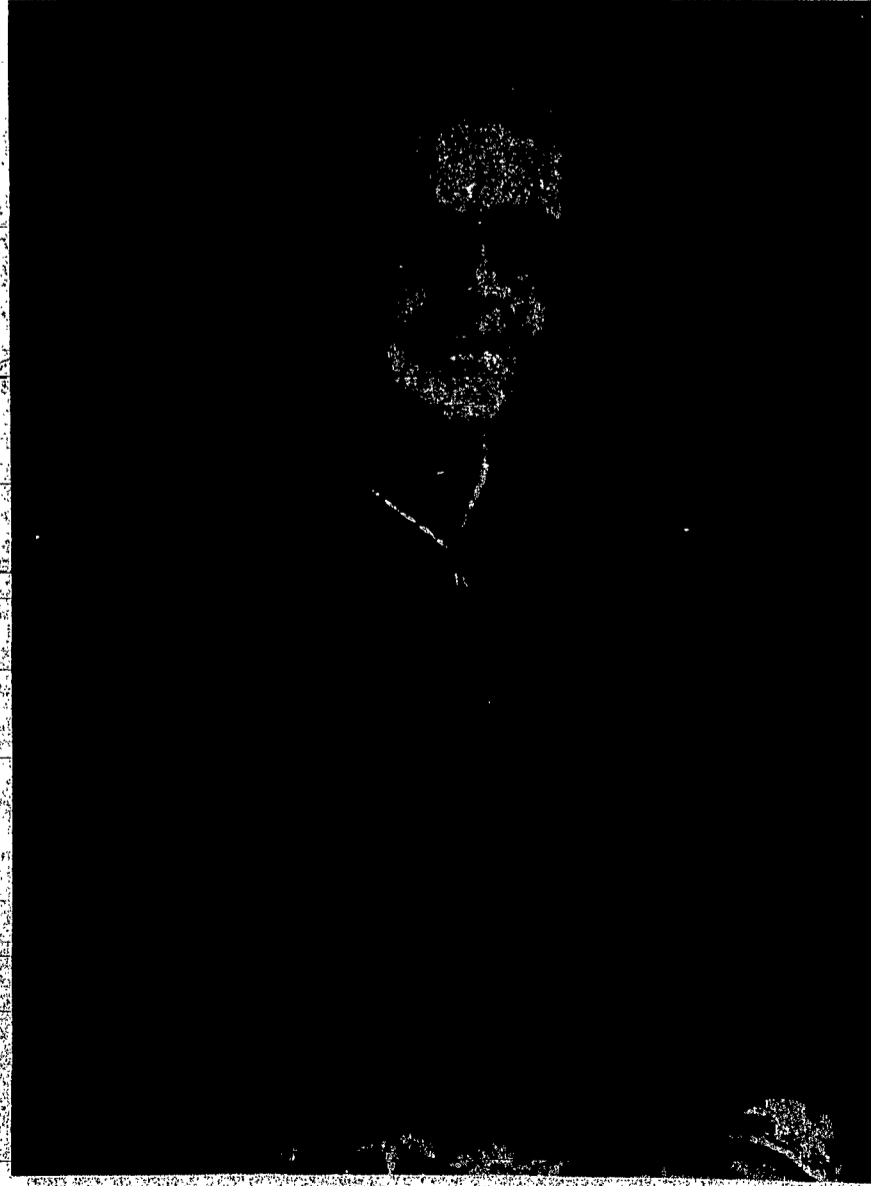

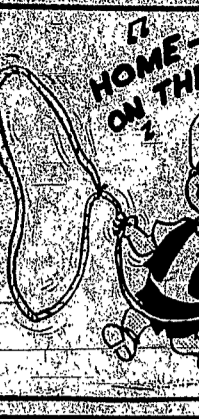
