Answer to Unrest ... Communication

Chicago — (RNS) — A Catholic university president asserted here that a major effort to avert campus dissent must be "to achieve understanding," and that if youth is to learn from age, and age is to learn from youth, there must be communication.

Father James F. Maguire, S.J., president of Loyola University, Chicago, told a Loyola Citizens Board audience that "the young are strang-ers to stability," adding that the youth today have known change and only change and, not fearing it, "leap to embrace it."

Conversely, he noted, age is not at home with change and requires stability. He said that as a result the older generation is wedded to its institutions - structures of past lives.

Father Maguire suggested that the college-age person can't understand why their "hang-ups" on Vietnam, the

Noting that while youth obviously has much to learn from age, the priest said that "not so obvious, particularly to men and women in the 40s, 50s, and 60s, is the truth that age has much to learn from youth-if age is to be the discriminating protector of our institutions."
