Bishop Kearney's basketball team will open its 1969-1970 season Friday in the Kearney gym. Game time is 8:45 p.m.

This year's team will have an 18 game schedule and compete in the new City-Catholic League, with high hopes of bettering last year's dismal 6-14 record.

CYO Basketballers To Start Play Sunday

Seventy-two basketball teams of 1,364 high school and elementary school boys will play opening games Sunday, Nov. 30 in the Catholic Youth Organization's Monroe County Basketball League.

Participating in the 10-week schedule will be 36 teams in

the high school division and 42 teams in the grammar school division, each team representing its parish. Each division has been divided into North, South, East and West sections.

The top three winners in each of the high sections will compete for the county cham-

ampionship on Feb. 12 and 22. The top two teams in the elementary sections also will have playoffs for the championship at the same time.

Winners will compete with champion teams from the Elmira Corning, Geneva, Seneca Falls and Auburn areas in the

annual Diocesan CYO Championship Tournaments on Mar. 6, 7 and 8 in Monroe, Elmira and Auburn gymnasiums.

Revamped Aquinas 5 Takes on Batavia

A new coaching staff and a lot of new players will give Aquinas Institute a revamped look this basketball season, which opens tonight, Nov. 28, at the old R.I.T. gymnasium on Spring St. Batavia High is the opening game opponent.

John Uriah, a Dayton University graduate and former Johnstown, Pa. coach, takes over the varsity coaching job and will have two new assistants working with him—John Dunnigan, who moves up to coach the junior varsity team and Brendan Carnody, who'll handle the freshman team.

The Uriah regime replaces the highly successful one of Gerry McGuire. McGuire moved up to head of the school's business department.

Gone are nearly all the players from last year's 7-12 outfit. There are no returning starters. The only letter-winners back are 6-4, 220-pound senior Pete Schlacter, who saw considerable action last season; senior Steve Centron, a 5-8, 155-pound guard; junior Tom Rowling, a forward who played some brilliant basketball last season and Larry Mitchell, a guard, who was brought up from the JV squad in mid-season. Centron and Schlacter, both football players, are the only seniors on the roster.

"I'm happy to have a few experienced players back," says Uriah. "At least I've got some kind of nucleus with which to

work. The rest of the club lacks varsity experience, but it does have good size and some good potential. I think this club will be a good one as the season progresses."

A "sleeper" in the Irish camp is 6-foot-3, 190-pound John Duignan. He played a lot of JV ball last year. With his height, he could be the Irish starting center and maybe even the stand out on the club.

Another player who could surprise a few people before the season is over is hustling Tom Hell, a 5-foot-9, 155-pound junior who has shown some great moves in practice.

Still another junior who figures to be in contention for a starting spot is Mike Craig, a 6-foot-3, 205-pounder who did a super job for Aquinas' football team.

One of the most promising of the elevated junior varsity players is Brady Spetz. A junior, 6-foot-3, 180 pounds, he could win himself a starting

spot in the front court with his vigorous rebounding.

Other forwards in contention for a starting berth are Richard Millerick and Chris Fedick, both impressive in practice.

Six-foot-1 Fedick, a solid 185 pounds and a football player, is tough under the boards.

Reserve back court strength will come from Rudy Valentino and Dave Fagan.
