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vital, it had to continually reassess its efficiency, its morale and its shortcomings. The Seminary could be no exception to this rule for it is a human institution, established in its traditional structure long after Christ founded His Church and given no divine guarantee of permanency."

The campaign, largest ever undertaken in the history of the Diocese, was titled the Joint College Fund, with a goal of \$9,000,000 in cash and pledges. More than \$10,500,000 was pledged. Two years later, in 1967, Becket Hall was opened, and Father Hogan was named its first rector.

In 1966 Father Hogan was raised by Pope Paul VI to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor.

In 1968 Monsignor Hogan's accomplishments gained further recognition when he was named a Diocesan Consultor by Bishop Fulton J. Sheen.

On June 27, 1968, Monsignor Hogan was named pastor of St. Margaret Mary Church in the Rochester suburb of Irondequoit. He succeeded Msgr. Maynard A. Connell, who retired because of poor health and who resides with a brother in Rochester.

St. Margaret Mary, one of the largest and most active diocesan parishes, has a 16-classroom parochial school one of the most thorough Confraternity of Christian Doctrine religious educa-

tion programs, serving nearly 1,000 boys and girls of the parish, both preschoolers and those who attend public schools, elementary through high school. The program is staffed by more than 70 priests, Sisters, seminarians and lay volunteers.

Among features in the very busy parochial school program are a senior school hand with nearly 50 members and a junior band with 35 pupils. They are directed by Frank Melville of East

Recently inaugurated in the parish was a Guard of Honor, with volunteer parishioners succeeding each other throughout the day in half-hour vigils in church before the Blessed Sacrament.

Monsignor Hogan had been deeply involved for 17 months in administration of his parish when news came of his selection as seventh Bishop of Roch-

FULTON JOHN SHEEN (1966-1969) Bishop Kearney's successor, Bishop

Fulton J. Sheen, was installed as sixth Bishop of Rochester on Dec. 15, 1966. Eminent for years as a professor, writer, and lecturer on the platform and on the radio and television. Bishop Sheen had already been consecrated a bishop of the Society for the Propagation of

Rochester on October 21, 1966 the Courier-Journal called him "the man everybody knows."

• During his brief and spectacular stay as Bishop of Rochester, Bishop Sheen was most noted for his reorganization of the internal structure of the diocese. New offices and appointments were the establishment of vicariates for urban ministry, pastoral planning and Christian formation, and a Spanish Apostolate and four secular missions. Two territorial vicariates were also es-

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
