Shakespeare was way ahead of his time when he said "What's in a name?". Today we identify everyone by a number. Whether this is good or bad may be debatable, but when dealing with large numbers of people it does seem to be more efficient. For one thing, a number can immediately identify an area, a group, and an individual.

Since large numbers are involved in MONEY LABELS and it's set up on a group basis, numbers play a very important role. For instance, when you received the Saver's Guide, you may have noticed that a ten-digit number was printed on the address label. Each one of these ten digits has a special significance. The first figure, "1", represents the Rochester diocese (groups in the Buffalo diocese, also participating in the program, have "2" as the first figure). The next three figures represent your particular church or club, and the last six, you the individual

Let's say, for example, that you're registered as a member of Holy Cross parish, Rochester. Your number would be 1 (for the Rochester diocese), 008 (for Holy Cross) plus six other figures (for you the individual member of this parish). Is this important? Well, for one thing this number assignment can be of real help to your chairman. In cases where there may be misspellings, wrong addresses etc., she can spot these quickly by referring to her numerical list of members. Noting the numbers on the address labels can also be useful when you're receiving gift was the 23rd annual premore than one copy of the Savers Guide and other material. This duplication means that as well as being registered in your church, you're also registered in some other group. A call to the MONEY LABELS chairman at your church can clarify this.

In the future we hope to avoid such duplication. As we've said before, in a brand new program such as this there are bound to be some difficulties at first. Just as we want every member of a registered group to receive the Savers Guide, etc., we also want them to receive only one of whatever is sent. heir 'number' can be the key to a successful operation.




