

FRED FOWLER'S COLLEGE FOOTBALL RATINGS

Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings measure the comparative strength of major college football teams for a particular season. Similar to baseball averages, they differ in that they are not confined to a single department such as batting. Teams actually rate themselves on their game performances. Factors considered are offense, defense and caliber of opposition. Although the ratings provide a measurement of the average strength of opponents, they do NOT forecast game results. Normally, a team with a rating 10 points higher than its opponent may be considered the favorite. However, the ratings make no allowance for home field, morale factors, injuries, illness, lineup changes, weather conditions, etc. Fowler started his rating system in 1944 and originally used it for basketball. It was successful from the start, but some refinements have been added during the past 20 years. Today it is one of the more accurate methods of comparing the relative strength of college football teams.

Penn State Climbs; Missouri Still No. 1

Bowl-bound Penn State and San Diego State became the third and fourth major college football teams to close their seasons unbeaten, joining Toledo with 10-0 records. Southern California, undefeated but with one tie, completes the quartet with 9-0-1.

Penn State's 33-8 win over North Carolina State gave the Lions a string of 29 games without defeat and raised them to ninth in Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings. They can go

higher Jan. 1 when they meet top ranked Missouri in the Orange Bowl.

Down 32-21 at the three-quarter mark, San Diego State rallied to nip stubborn Long Beach State, 36-32, and climb to 25th in the ratings. It was the 20th game in a row without loss for the Aztecs.

Meanwhile, Texas and Arkansas put their perfect records on the line Saturday in a nationally televised game that will deter-

mine the Southwest conference champ.

This game also answers three questions: who plays Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl (the winner), who plays Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl (the loser), and how good is Arkansas?

A soft schedule, with wins against such creampuffs as Wichita State and Tulsa, has kept Arkansas down in the ratings. The Hogs are currently

rated 13th. A win over Texas would prove they belong higher, and a big win would indicate they've been hiding in the weeds for the Longhorns all season.

Although still third, Texas climbed within two points of top ranked Missouri when the Longhorns overwhelmed Texas A&M, 49-12, Thanksgiving Day. They go into the Arkansas game as an 8 1/2 point favorite, and can take the number one spot with a convincing triumph.

Knights Face Irish

The basketball rivalry between Aquinas and McQuaid, one of the hottest in the area, will be renewed tonight when the Irish and the Knights clash at the old RIT gymnasium on Spring Street. Opening whistle is set for 8:15 p.m. with a junior varsity preliminary getting under way at 6:30 p.m.

The game will mark the 10th season of competition between the cross-city schools and the outcome is anybody's guess. Both squads are expected to be

at a high pitch, and past performances are poor indicators in their arch rivalry. Last year the Jesuits won both encounters with Aquinas, 51-49 and 59-52.

The Knights will look to the scoring punch of Ray O'Neill and Mike Ryan who combined to give McQuaid 28 points against the Barons. Coach John Uralis, meeting his first Rochester Diocesan opponent, will count heavily on the sharp shooting of John Dulgnan and Brady Spetz to help the Irish cause. Both boys scored 13 points in the Batavia game.

Kearney Fights Back To Defeat Sodus

Bishop Kearney's Kings fought back opening game blues in the first half of the season's start last Friday and conquered the quick, and victory-minded Sodus Spartans, 63-52 on the Kings' floor.

Kearney had woes early in the first half, when juniors Mike Goman and Paul Riesenberger quickly got into foul trouble. Sodus dominated play by controlling the boards and at halftime Sodus led 32-26.

With John Maurer, Larry Rogers, and reserve Jim Erbland leading the way, Kearney gained the edge within the first 30 seconds of the fourth period. With 3:25 remaining on the clock, and Kearney holding a

53-44 edge, the hosts executed a freeze.

Sodus was led by the shooting of Austin Snead with 20 points, and Steve Sucher tallied 11. Rogers scored 15 points and Maurer 14, 11 in the second half. Maurer also captured 13 rebounds. Erbland had 10 points.

City-Catholic League play starts tonight (Friday) for the Kings when they host Cardinal Mooney at 8:45 p.m. Next Friday, Dec. 12, Franklin's team comes to the Kearney court. On Saturday, the 13th, the Kings travel to do battle with Marshall. The Jayvees play at 7:00 p.m. in the preliminaries.

McQuaid Runs Second In Jesuit Title Meet

McQuaid's best cross-country campaign in 5 years ended on a winning note at the annual Jesuit Championships in New York City.

The Knights' varsity runners slipped and slogged over a mucky course at Van Cortland Park to take second place in a 9-school field, while their freshmen topped 5 schools, carrying away the first-place trophy for the fifth time in six years.

Sophomore Dick Sheridan led the Knights, with an excellent 13:52 clocking for third place among 63 runners. Senior Phil Horton was 3 seconds back in fifth place, and Mike Cramer (16), Greg Smith (18), and Pat Cullinane (19) bunched together to give McQuaid 61 points. Fordham Prep, runner-up for the past 3 years, won with 44 points.

McQuaid's fresh packed all 6 runners into the top 12 of a 62-runner field to defeat Fordham, 34-48. Giving the Knights their best grouping of the season were Bill Shafer (4), Chris Horton (5), Jerry DeFelle (6), Mike Hudson (8), Rusty Madden (11) and Gordie Keenan (12).

McQuaid also had a medalist in the J.V. race, with Jeff Rosenberger taking second place.

Teamwise, the Knights had these season records: Varsity, 94 wins, 14 losses; J.V., 69 wins, 17 losses; Freshman 80 wins, 5 losses.

The season's Most Improved Runner award went to sophomore John Hurley.

Brighton Swimmer On Bona Squad

When St. Bonaventure University's swimmers go into action Monday, Dec. 1, at Niagara University, they will be led by Rick Martin, a junior from Brighton.

Martin holds the SBU pool record in the 200-yard fly event with a time of 2:09.3. Last spring he finished fourth in the 1650-yard event in New York State competition.
